Engage with participatory art installations across campus—look for pop-up exhibits, mapping activities, and live AR stations that invite you to rethink your relationship with the planet.

## Educational Toolkits & Installations (April 23, 2025 6-7 PM)

Experience hands-on, student-designed educational toolkits addressing climate justice, and multispecies awareness. Developed by participants in the Design & Environments course, these toolkits reimagine public learning through zines, interactive maps, visual campaigns, and DIY activism.

#### Workshops + Dialogue Space (Jan 22-Apr 16 & Mar 31-April 3, 2025)

Throughout the semester—and intensively during <u>SIA25</u>—a series of workshops and discussions laid the foundation for *Eco-Fest*. Covering topics such as design justice, eco-poetry, and art for advocacy, these sessions equipped participants with tools and inspiration to develop public-facing projects grounded in storytelling, activism, and interdisciplinary exploration.

## Why Eco-Fest?

Eco-Fest is both a public event and a **living curriculum**—a way to bring classroom learning into the real world through **design, collaboration, and activism.** It builds on the legacy of last year's *Collide i+i* project, where students in the *Design & Environments* course created immersive, site-responsive works for Rowan's Centennial Celebration. This year, the course continues its commitment to interdisciplinary engagement, using design as a tool for ecological awareness and public dialogue. We believe that art and design can drive change, and this week is about sharing those ideas with the Rowan community.
