The State Championship loss isn't the first problem the team has faced, explained assistant coach of the warriors, Lisa McKeon. 'At the beginning of the season, we had to blend two basketball programs together once the girls from St.Peters transferred to Curtis.' McKeon explains. She also explained how the girls quickly became a family, and that it was as if they had known each other their whole lives. 'Because the girls began to work together so well so quickly, they started to develop as a team.' Bob Daggot (Varsity Assistant Coach) explains. They finished their regular season with a record of 12 wins and 2 losses. They constantly held a winning streak as they played against Staten Island High School teams along with teams from Queens, The Bronx and Long Island. The Warriors had developed over their individual skills over this season, so now they were ready for the playoffs.
