What are Positive Behaviors Interventions & Supports (PBIS)?

Positive Behavior Interventions & Supports are a process for creating school environments that are more predictable and effective for achieving academic and social goals.

How does it work?

A key strategy of the PBIS process is prevention. The majority of students follow the school's expectations, but are never acknowledged for their positive behavior. Through instruction, comprehension, and regular practice, all teachers and staff members will use a consistent set of behavioral rules. We will view these rules as an opportunity for re-teaching, not just punishment.

What about families?

Families are an important part of PBIS implementation. We encourage families to use the same expectations and rules that the school teaches. This common language creates consistency and a unified support for expected student behavior. Families are asked to discuss the common rules and expectations at home. Children thrive when they have consistent, predictable expectations and consequences.

McManus Dress Code Policy:

CUSD Dress Code

Student dress has been shown to influence behavior and the learning environment. It is expected that all students shall wear clothes that are clean, neat, appropriate, safe and not disruptive to the teaching and learning process.

McManus Elementary School follows the district dress code policy and the following items are enforced on our campus:

- Any attire that is apt to be distracting to others, unsafe, or represents possible gang association are not permitted.
- Clothing that exposes the torso is not permitted.
- Exposure of undergarments or bare feet is prohibited.
- Clothing, buttons, or school materials which show obscene or alcohol/drug/ tobacco, gang related slogans, words, or pictures, or sexually suggestive/vulgar statements are prohibited.
- All shoes must have a back strap. Loose sandals or shoes are not prohibited.
- Hats should be worn forward and removed inside buildings. Hoods on sweatshirts should also be removed while in class and indoors.
- Spaghetti strap styled tops may not be worn. Shoulder straps must have a 2-inch width.
- Wearing make-up is not permitted.
- Shorts and skirts must have an inseam that is no shorter than 3 inches.

Conflict & Bullying

What is Bullying?

Bullying can be physical, verbal, relational, or done through technology. Bullying is intentional aggressive behavior, repeated over time, and involves an imbalance of power.

What is Rude?

Rude is saying or doing something that intentionally hurts someone else. Examples: a negative comment on someone's clothes, ability to play a game, or jumping ahead in line.

What is Mean?

Mean is purposefully saying or doing something to hurt someone one time. Examples: Saying, "I hate you" or "You are stupid."
