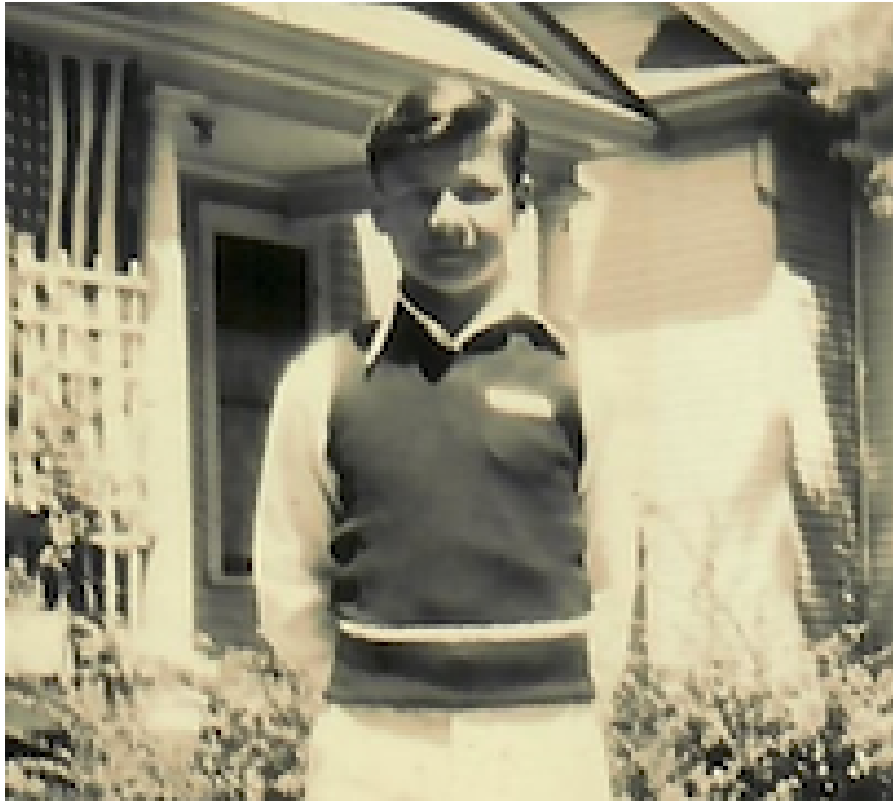

Monument Firm Owner Dies, At 56

William H. Friedrich, 56, of 1504 W. Murdock Ave., owner of Friedrich-Pugh Monument Co., died Sunday at 7:45 p.m. at Mercy Medical Center. He had been hospitalized one week.

He had served the past 15 years as secretary-treasurer of Oshkosh Kiwanis Club. A veteran of World War II, he served overseas with the Army in England and France for 34 months.

He was born in Oshkosh on Sept. 11, 1913, son of William J. and Martha Friedrich, and was married to Miss Lorraine Pugh on March 28, 1948. He was a member of Oshkosh Elks.

Surviving are his widow, Lorraine; two sons, Craig and Brad Friedrich, Oshkosh; one brother, Carl A. Friedrich, Oshkosh; and two sisters, Mrs. Elmer Paepke and Mrs. Herman Paffenroth, Oshkosh.

FRIEDRICH WINS BRONZE STAR MEDAL

A citation accompanying the award of the bronze star medal to William H. Friedrich, husband of Mrs. Lorraine Friedrich, 588 West Murdock street, for "meritorious service in connection with military operations" from Dec. 11, 1944 until May 8, 1945, in Europe, was received Wednesday.

Friedrich, who was discharged from the army with the rank of technician third grade, Dec. 11, 1945, was attached to the adjutant general's office in the European theater. He served a total of 34 months in England and France.

The citation was as follows: "For meritorious service in connection with military operations involving the movement of highly trained specialists to units where they were vitally needed, enabling those commands to contribute their fullest support to the armies."

Mr. Friedrich entered the army Sept. 12, 1942. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Friedrich, 9 East New York avenue.

T/5 William H. Friedrich, 1094 Algoma boulevard, was with headquarters detachment of European theater service forces and infantry and received the victory medal, ETO service ribbon with one bronze star, good conduct medal, five overseas service bars and one service stripe. He entered service Aug. 29, 1942.
