Toss-up #1:

What do each of these letters have in common?

ç ö á क ٿ

They all feature diacritic marks/ accents.

Bonus: The diacritic **Ö** can have several different meanings. Explain one of the uses.

Umlaut: - changes the sound of the vowel (usually fronts it)

Diaeresis: - indicates that the vowel is sounded separately and is not part of a diphthong.

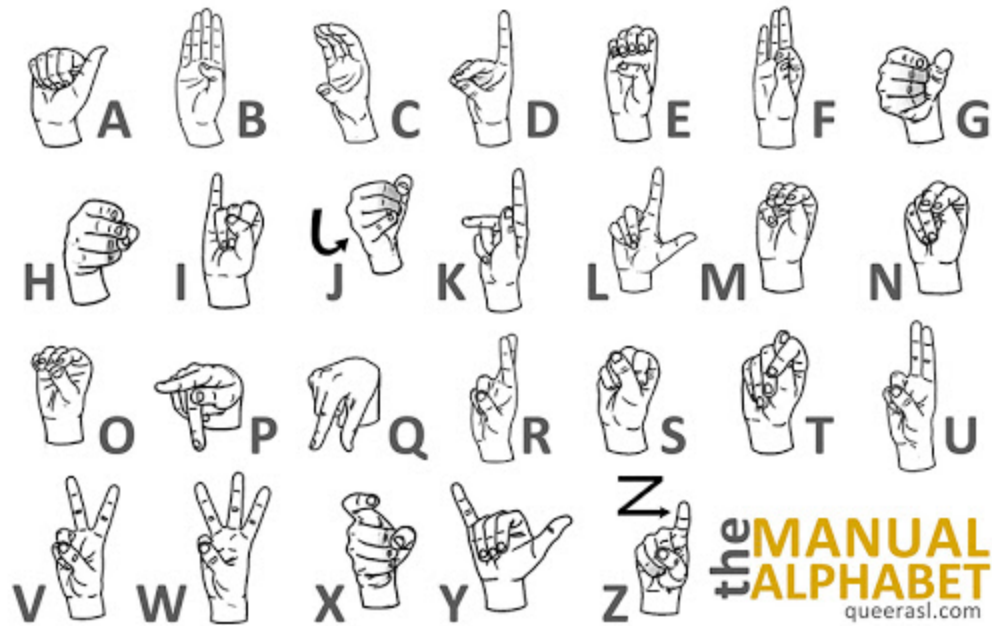
Toss-up #2: Looking at these two pictures of an ASL signer, what does the difference in facial expression convey?

The type of question being asked. Eyebrows lowered for wh-questions. Eyebrows raised for yes/no question.

Toss-up #3: From which ancient alphabet did the Latin alphabet derive?

Phonetician, Greek.

Bonus: Which two modern English letters did not exist in the Latin alphabet?

J and W

Toss-up #4: Which of the following words does not morphologically belong?

abnormal, acellular, **auctioneer**, antiseptic

Bonus: Why doesn't *auctioneer* belong?

It does not have a prefix.

Toss-up #5: What is the term for a language in which words are formed by stringing morphemes together without changing them in spelling or phonemics?

Agglutinative.

Bonus: What types of information might be contained in an agglutinative slot?

Tense, number, case, honorific, aspect, mood,...

Toss-up #6: Name three dialects of the English language.

American English, British English, African American Vernacular English, Scottish English, any other acceptable answers.

Bonus: Name three dialects of the Spanish language.

Peninsular Spanish, Mexican Spanish, Chilean Spanish, Rioplatense, Andalusian Spanish, Cuban Spanish, New Mexican, Andean, Castellano, Phillipine, Judaeo-Spanish could count (NOT ladino), Canarian, Ecuadorian, Carribean, Uruguayan, Guatemalan, Murcian, Peruvian, Panamanian, Puerto Rican, are we counting pidgins like Chavacano?

NOT Acceptable: Catalan

Toss-up #7: Which modern language native to Europe has no known relatives in its language family?

Basque

Bonus: What contrast between consonants is Basque notable for?

Between two types of /s/, (person gives explanation for laminal vs apical pronunciations or pronounces them, basically laminal = with the tongue blade, apical = with the tongue tip)



Toss-up #8: What scripts are melded together on this sign?

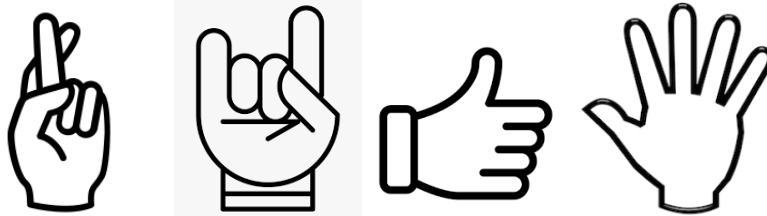
Arabic and Hebrew, in Aravrit

Bonus: What is another abjad besides Arabic and Hebrew?

Syrian Aramaic/Syriac, Thaana (Maldivian), Samaritan, Sogdian, Ugaritic, Punic, Psalter, Middle Persian, South Arabian, Sabaean, Proto-Canaanite, Manichean, Nabatean, Ancient Berber, Parthian

Toss-up #9:

What do the following symbols have in common?



They are friendly and positive gestures in the U.S. but considered rude in many other countries.

Bonus: For this Bonus, you will need to turn on your camera, when recognized, and demonstrate.

What gesture, which originates from Hawaii, is used to convey the “Aloha spirit” as a greeting, concept of friendship, and symbol of Hawaiian solidarity.

Black, White, Red

Bonus: If a language has four, what will the next one be?

Blue / Green / Blue-Green

Toss-up #11: "Cybernetics" is a compound word – what are the two roots in it?

Cybernet-, -ics

Explanation: it derives from the Greek word kubernētēs, meaning “helmsman”

Bonus: What is it called when people mistakenly etymologize words, and then create new words based off of the perceived roots (ex: "cybercafe", "cyberspace", instead of "cybernecafe"/"cybernespace" etc.)

Rebracketing

Toss-up #12: The word “cleave” has two definitions: “to cut apart,” or “to bind together.” Words with two meanings definitions which are opposite of one another are called _____.

Contronyms / Auto-antonyms

Bonus: Name another English contronym.

“dust,” “literally,” “finish,” “bill”

Chinese characters (also accept Hanzi)

Purple northeast region (if they say northeast that should also be okay)

Bonus: Name the two closely related indigenous American languages that make up the Delaware languages, also called the Lenape languages.

Toss up #28: Name three sounds the symbol <x> represents

/ʃ, ɕ, x, ɣ, ks, ɖ, dz, i~ɥ, s, z, ʒ, ll, t', ʔ, ħ/ (also accept "sh" and "zh" and "kh")

Bonus: What sound did the symbol make in latin?

/ks/ (like character)

Toss up #29: Tolkien “translated” his names for his hobbits from Westron (a conlang) into a real earth language. In what real language were they rendered?

(Old) English

Bonus: Of the five (old) english rendered names – Bilbo, Pippin, Merry, Frodo, or Samwise – can you name one of the Westron names of one of them?

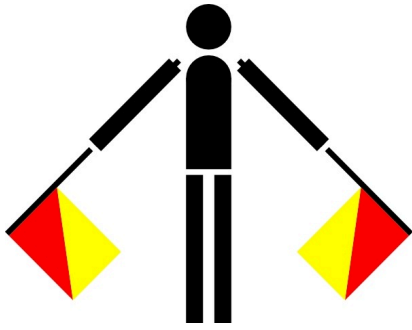
