Leadership

Sen. Mitch McConnell:

The Hill (6/13/17): The top two GOP leaders on Capitol Hill — Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-Ky.) and Speaker Paul Ryan (R-Wis.) — wouldn't comment on Mueller's team but praised Mueller himself. "I have a lot of confidence in Bob Mueller. I think it was a good choice," McConnell told reporters.

Speaker Paul Ryan:

- At a news conference Tuesday, Ryan grew frustrated at having to answer so many questions about what he called media-generated "rumors" that Mueller could soon be ousted. But the Speaker made clear he believed Trump should not interfere with the FBI probe. "I think the best thing to do is to let Robert Mueller do his job. I think the best vindication for the president is to let this investigation go on independent and thoroughly," Ryan said. "That to me is the smartest thing to do, the best thing to do, hopefully it will happen." The Hill: GOP leaders are unified: Firing Mueller a bad idea
- House Speaker Paul Ryan, R-Wis., said, "My priority has been to ensure thorough and independent investigations are allowed to follow the facts wherever they may lead. That is what we've been doing here in the House. The addition of Robert Mueller as special counsel is consistent with this goal, and I welcome his role at the Department of Justice."
- <u>Talking Points Memo</u> 7/12/17: Ryan told reporters on Wednesday that it's important to get to the bottom of what happened, but that's a job for special counsel Robert Mueller and the congressional intelligence committees.

Sen. Roy Blunt
