

Use Bold For Your Article Title, With An Initial Capital Letter For Any Proper Nouns

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Abstract: Purpose, in simple words tell readers about the purpose of the research/project/work. There was no discussion, no story, only the purpose of the research/project/work. Methodolgy shows the design of methods of the research/project/work; data collection and data analysis techniques used to conduct the research/project/work. Results and discussion covers the main results and discussion in a few words. Write only main results and discussion. They are a summary of your key findings and an explanation of why your findings and key message contribute to the field/s. No formula needed and avoid quotes and extensive references. The abstract is ended with the implication/impact/meaning/contribution of the results of the research/project/work (maximum 250 words).

Keywords: Keywords help readers find your article, so are vital for discoverability. If the journal instructions for authors don't give a set number of keywords to provide, aim for five or six.

How to Cite: Provide intext citation in APA style, e.g. (Harris, 2001).

Introduction

Authors should provide an adequate background, and literature survey in order to record the existing solutions/method, to show which is the best of previous researches/projects/works, to show the main limitation of the previous researches/projects/works, to show what do you hope to achieve (to solve the limitation), and to show the scientific merit or novelties of the paper. Please follow this guide to show the level of the section headings in your article:

1. First-level headings (e.g. Introduction, Conclusion) should be in bold, with an initial capital letter for any proper nouns.
2. Second-level headings should be in bold italics, with an initial capital letter for any proper nouns.
3. Third-level headings should be in italics, with an initial capital letter for any proper nouns.

Please DO NOT PUT LITERATURE REVIEW of different sub chapter. Authors can include the literature or previous research/project/work on Introduction. This is very important. After you provide brief introduction and the problem you want to study, you need to put previous researches/projects/works (literature review) that had been done related to your research/project/work

problem and how they are different from your research/project/work. This will lead to the novelties of your paper.

Methodology

Present the materials, methods, survey, questionnaire etc. used for the research/project/work. Author should explain whether this research/project/work is experimental, or review study, or simulation based or survey based, etc. Discuss software, hardware's used during study with their brand names. Mention all research/project/work conditions, assumptions, theories followed. This section should be easy enough for any reader to repeat the research/project/work under similar conditions.

Results and discussion

Results should be clear and concise. The results should summarize (scientific) findings rather than providing data in great detail. Present raw data here without comment, using tables and figures if this makes the data clearer. What answer was found to the research/project/work question; what did the research/project/work find?

The discussion should explore the significance of the results of the research/project/work, not repeat them. Comment on the data, referring to the literature (compare it to previous researches/projects/works) and pointing out similarities and differences, explaining these if possible. Return to the aim and research/project/work question and show how the aims have been met, and the research/project/work question answered.

In discussion, it is the most important section of your article. Here you get the chance to sell your data. What might the answer imply and why does it matter? How does it fit in with what other researchers/projects/works have found? What are the perspectives for future research/project/work? Please compare to what other researchers/projects/works have found.

Tables and figures

It is very important that you have been given permission to use any tables or figures you are reproducing from another source before you submit. Table must be numbered in the order of presentation (Table 1, Table 2, etc.). The table title is placed above the table with the center position (centered). Use Tahoma font size 11 for the title of table.

(horizontal borders are only used at the start and end without vertical lines, each horizontal column uses gray and white alternately)

Figure must be numbered in the order of presentation (Figure 1, Figure 2, etc.). The figure title is placed below the figure with the center position (centered). Writing the figure number is followed by a period (.) then the title of the figure. Tahoma font size used is 11pt, the position in the middle. Each description of the figure to be completed with the source or reference is marked with square brackets [...] on the opening and closing the source. Each table description comes with the source or reference, to indicate the location of the figure, use the number of the figure. Don't use the words below, above, the following, etc.

Conclusion

Conclusion should be written in very clear words. It should explain how the objectives of the research/project/work are accomplished.

References

All references should be in APA style and presented inside the main body of article. You should attach at least 15 references. References should be in last decade. Use Mendeley to write the references. The use of primary source for the references is strongly recommended. References from website should be avoided. Reference list entries should be alphabetized by the last names of the first author of each work. Journal names, conference name and book titles should be italicized. Example:
