Front Entrance Installation Updates

Today we discussed re-setting and getting back to basics for planning FFL interventions on common areas to reduce our dependence on irrigation, reduce maintenance, and improve the landscape aesthetic over time. Discussions included determining a common area plant palette and design planning considerations.

1. Using muhly grass (and +/- coontie) to line the entrance and exit walls, with the addition of some understory plants which have different color leaves, flower colors, and plant structure at the front. JoAnn and Merrylee plan to remeasure the front "runway" along the sides. Salvia (red, pink, white), false indigo &/or blue porter Purple and blue), blanket flower (orange and yellow), swamp lily (white) were discussed (Pat was looking for pricing, Meg is providing a list of reputable nurseries)

2. SOIRL 200 foot shoreline restoration project, where ground cover would be installed the 3-5 foot "no" maintenance buffer next to the shoreline (railroad vine, sunshine mimosa, frogfruit, or other mixed mowable ground covers) then above that using a sod cutter to remove the grass in the 10-15 foot "low" maintenance buffer where we would install a simple palette including the existing palms, maybe adding pines +/- or pond cypress (deep rooted, no knees help stabilize the bank) with some muhly or other native grasses and possibly 1-3 other low maintenance specimens TBD based on selected palette. (Discussion will continue next meeting 6/24/25)

Meg met with Jodi from Aquatic Rain and discussed the criteria for Gold level recognition for Florida Friendly Landscape Recognition of commercial and common areas of existing HOAs.

If an irrigation system is present:

1. Irrigation system is calibrated to apply 1/2" to 3/4" of water per application. (p. 23)
2. A functioning automatic rainfall shutoff device is maintained on an operational in-ground irrigation system. (p. 23)
3. Irrigation system is free from leaks and broken emitters.
4. Irrigation emitters apply water in correct spray patterns, minimizing overspray on impervious surfaces.
5. The irrigation controller is set in compliance with water management district restrictions.

Number of Required Principals for Certification of Irrigation:

5 for Silver, 7 for Gold level

1. Not more than 50 percent of the irrigation system (by area) is high-volume.

2. Turfgrass and landscape plants are irrigated only as needed according to UF/IFAS recommendations and in compliance with any existing watering restrictions.
3. A smart controller (evapotranspiration, soil moisture sensor, or similar) is installed and operational. (p.25)
4. Separate irrigation zones for turf and landscape plants are installed and maintained.
5. Spray and rotor heads are not mixed on the same irrigation zone.
6. Low-flow irrigation is installed and maintained in plant and flower beds. (p. 24)
7. The irrigation system is maintained seasonally to adjust spray patterns and repair clogs and leaks.
8. Irrigation emitters rise above turfgrass height.
9. Sprinklers and emitters shall be located at least two feet from any structure
10. Sprinklers in low-lying areas have check valves.

Monday 11/4/24

Met with Skip Healy of Change of Greenery and Andrea Thill of CW. We discussed the criteria for Commercial recognition of Florida Friendly Landscapes, the proposed area for the project at the front of the neighborhood and the goals to meet the objectives for improving the aesthetic of the community, communication our commitment to best management practices in the landscape through the design and to create a palette that could easily be reproduced throughout the community in order to reduce maintenance costs, by decreasing our dependence on irrigation and chemical inputs on the common areas over time.

Wednesday 10/30/24

Meg M. Met with Melanie H from Brevard County Natural Resources in CW to review our resources & research to date.

We discussed the modified timeline for stormwater quality testing & training of homeowner stakeholders. I gave her the notebook started (by Meg M.) around November 2021 when we began researching a pond beautification initiative. Wednesday October 23, 2024

Meg M. Met with Eric from Go Native Landscape (vendor for Lagoon Loyal Neighborhood competition who sponsored buffer or butterfly garden prize).

Walked the pond and discussed what are potential solutions for adhering to the 10 foot recommended buffer, the challenges of torpedo grass, increasing shade cover by adding more cabbage palms (10 feet apart in groves or

clusters) and interspersing as planned with hardwoods. Requested a design plan from GO NATIVE designer Nicole Perna. [Common Area Design Plan 2024 Trees](#)

August 8 2024 Florida Friendly Collaborative meeting Notes:

The Mod/Arc form will be developed, and it will be completed by the Florida Friendly Collaborative – for each common area.

CWHOA COMMON AREA PLANTING PROGRAM:

To ensure proper maintenance, any improvements to planting sites on common areas will be designated by approved mod arc process with guidance from IFAS extension agents, arborist(s), and the CWHOA:

Goals:

1. To enhance the beauty of our neighborhood.
2. Increase the overall tree canopy, replacing trees & plants that have been removed over time and installing trees & plants that will thrive in areas that turf and other plantings have struggled in over the years.
3. Utilize Florida Friendly Landscape principles to plant beautiful low maintenance gardens beds with the “right plant in the right place” reducing / eliminating the need for irrigation on the common areas.

Meg, JoAnn, and Dana Sussmann (Senior Forester, Florida Forest Service)

1. Focus on just the common areas for community funded tree planting. (In the corner field area of OHD near Wickham) – can be a rain garden, a veggie garden, add trees for shade and a seating area (like a pocket park). The viburnum bushes are old and can be removed so they don't waste resources trimming.
2. Replace old, tired bushes with trees.
3. In the corner common area west end (next to 410 OHD) – in order to protect the bases of palm trees remove 5' around each of them and add mulch. Do each individual one as a beginning. (The trees should eventually be in a mulched bed with understory plantings). This gets people used to the rings around the palms before adding other plantings. This can also be done in the other common areas.
4. If parking is added to any common area, use permeable mesh or block and let the grass grow through, and water percolate into the ground.
5. Palms are slow growing. These palms DO NOT need to be trimmed each year – saving money. It's fine to go 10 – 2 (recommended 9-3 o'clock) in trimming.
6. With tree islands there is a maintenance component – Ensure there is sufficient mulch to minimize manual weeding or spraying.
7. Tree islands can reduce the cost for mowing
8. A tree nursery may be a supply of young trees for our development.

9. Any newly planted tree needs maintenance, watering, and pruning when young to get the shape needed for good growth. Ideally tie in drip irrigation during establishment of young trees.

I don't recommend specific trees as it's more important to answer these questions to determine the best choice.

Why are we planting the tree?

What are the characteristics of the planting site?

Canopy and root space

Sun/wind exposure

Soils (drainage, aeration, nutrient levels, pH etc)

Hardiness zone (minimum cold temperature)

What are the characteristics of the tree?

Size and shape

Evergreen or deciduous

Drought/salt/cold tolerance

Native/nonnative

- a. Along pond side of the road, on CWS, silver buttonwood, bottle brush or other recommended street trees.
- b. 1 Live oak on the grassy triangle between the sidewalk.

Live oaks are a beautiful shade tree—need to ensure there is enough room for this type of tree

There are varieties such as ‘Cathedral’ which grow more upright and do not need as much room for their canopy

- c. The traffic island at the back (OHD & OHD) can we add pines or other trees instead of the old shrubs?

Pines can be a good addition to an urban landscape but do best when planted in clusters with native ground cover and pine straw or pine bark mulch. They prefer an acidic soil, no irrigation (they do need watering during the establishment period), and will lose their lower branches as they mature

- 4. What trees would you plant in the back by Wickham Rd?

- 5. What are some low maintenance native / keystone species If we are planting a hedgerow on the boundaries or for other common areas.

Monthly Report for Florida Friendly Landscape Collaborative: A homeowner driven initiative to help the CWHOA make fact-based decisions related to the Country Walk Landscape, Irrigation, and Pond Maintenance Programs based on recommended practices by the State of Florida & UF / IFAS FFL Commercial Landscape Recognition Program. Monthly FFL Collaborative meetings continue, all are welcome (the next one is Tuesday December 12 at 3pm):

1. We are continuing to look for achievable areas to implement FFL Commercial & Common area Checklist criteria where possible to improve the quality and value of our green space: Mulch, invasive species, selection and pruning techniques for low maintenance plantings, stormwater pond management.
2. Celebrate successes – and lots of hard work by CWHOA volunteers!
 - a. CW FFL Mod-Arc language
 - b. FFL Landscape guidelines for homeowners
 - c. Mulching with pine bark
 - d. Removal of dead and diseased trees
 - e. Tree replacement mapping
 - f. Stormwater pond
3. Setting achievable goals: Landscape, irrigation, pond & trees goals
1-3-5-10 year planning:
 - Reserve items
 - Budget items
 - Free FFL classes for homeowners
 - We will be reviewing the UF model contracts and CW scope(s) of work in 2024
4. **On behalf of the FFL collaborative, we are formally recommending a change in pond vendor. See attached proposal.**

This is a comprehensive plan, which includes a maintenance program as one component. There is not a monthly service agreement required.

Landscaping:

What will Eric do based on his contract?

What does he do about the boundary line?

There needs to be documentation so that going forward we know what has happened.

The hedges were planted in 2014. The goal was that they would grow tall and that they would be kept trimmed.

Eric wants to trim those hedges to 6' so that they would be easier to maintain.

Custom Aquatic Pond Treatment company

Yes, they are more expensive BUT

Meg paid \$250 for pond planting map

Meg will pay \$500 for development of

Their monthly \$275 / monthly which is significantly more than right now. But they are not requiring monthly.

Our current company says that algae control takes monthly care, and because Sorko is only doing bi-monthly, then algae will grow.

We have relied on homeowner volunteers for

We currently have 1200 annual / month contract

Pat, a homeowner, is willing to subsidize the difference between our current contract (Sorko) and a new one.

Plantings are key to getting aeration proper.

Can we add the expense to this year's budget?

Florida Friendly Collaborative: Meeting notes September 12, 2023, 3pm**Agenda – Planning for tree plantings Attending: Meg, JoAnn, Pat, Cathie and Charlie**

Goal: Decide on a palette of trees for the community common areas. We need to develop a year, five-year and 10-year plan. This is so the plantings are not done all at once and so they will all mature and need replacing at one time. Also budgeting is a concern. There is money in the budget right now and depending on what we choose, we can move forward with several tree plantings before the end of the year. We should do an exhibit island so it is noticeable to the community...

Pat suggested: Choosing the same palette of trees and repeating it all over. No curbing in island, using mulch not rocks, not mounded. Favors trees but not dense bushes.

Meg suggested: Need tree islands in several places. All bougainvillea should be removed as they have thorns and are difficult to maintain and have them look good. Favors mulch, but no large area. Remove cement borders around islands. Need consistency of palette but not the same tree.

JoAnn suggested: Using the principle of the right plant in the right place, it is not recommended that we use the same thing repeated all over since the areas differ so much and the needs of one area is not the same as another.

Using recommendations by Bonnie Wells from the meeting on August 3, 2023. Every house should see three trees and the whole neighborhood should have 30% trees.

There are 12 Common Area zones:

#1 All common areas contiguous with front entrance

#2 End of Marshwood Ct (border to next door neighborhood)

#3 Shared area behind 357 County Walk Street and 440 Maple Bluff Court

#4 Shared area between 349 CWS and 402 CWS

#5 Shared area behind 309 CWS and 316 PRL

#6 Shared behind 301 PRL & 582 PFC

#7 Common area between 205 OHD and 273 OHD

#8 Empty lot 297 OHD

Pat said - she and Jules & two neighbor boys (who were paid \$15/hour) and worked for 2.5 hours who did most of the east end and some of the west end. Papyrus was removed. Pat will give a full report.

JoAnn and Meg did the bank along the west end twice. Removal of algae and some weeding took place.

Dick likes the plantings along the edges, but not in the pond itself.

Meg reported the observations made by the person who came to assess the mosquito population in the area. He said he didn't see any sign of mosquitoes.

Attending JoAnn Meaker, Pat Sullivan, Rachel Roberts

1. We agreed that our first priority is to move with Phase 3 of the Pond, with a focus on the west end restoration and erosion control, and a continuation of adding plantings along the edge of the whole pond and adding water lilies (in pots). We don't need more carp, but do need plants for them to feed on and hide under. (JoAnn requested a list of each of the phases of Pond word... 1, 2, and 3... for official notes.)

2. We discussed Jennifer Thompson's recommendations and how we can now move forward. The western shoreline restoration would follow her recommendation of sand baggy product, stone and proper shoreline plantings. We discussed adding soil to this area to recoup some of the shoreline that was lost during the last hurricane.

2. Pat will contact the Natural Resources Department at 321 633-2016, asking for environmental permitting to find out (a) if we need a permit to do the west end rehabilitation with sand baggy & stone & plantings ourselves

and (b) do we need a permit if we ask Landscaping Depot to do the work? Estimated cost of this work would be

\$1,500 - \$2,500, depending on the type of rock, and plantings.

3. As for the front area, we discussed each of the four renderings that Jules proposed and reviewed each of the plants included in the drawings. No decision about specific plantings were made but we did agree that:

- a. We should remove the plantings in front of the two signs
- b. We should use some of the same types of plantings there as in the center island
- c. We should be careful not to use plantings that are too large to avoid covering the sign over time.
- d. We want this area to be free from the landscaping company.

4. Work at the front area should wait until the fall which may be a better time for planting.

5. In discussion of the center island areas. We talked about keeping the large oak tree and the Jatropha (red flowering bush) and the two smaller yellow flowering bushes in front of the Jatropha. We agree that we need to use less types of plants and more volume of them. The perimeter of this center island area would be edged in stone just within the curbing and the mulch removed. This may involve moving the irrigation heads. Soil can be added as needed to help the area.

6. We realize that not everyone will agree on the types of plants that should be used in each of the 12 common areas, but we should be sure that in each place the type of plant selected would be appropriate for that particular spot (full sun, part sun, full shade etc).

Pat will ask about needing a permit to do the bank work ourselves (per suggestion of Jennifer Thompson).

Follow up: Report by Pat

"As per your request, I called and spoke with Connie at Natural Resources who referred me to the road and bridge people at 321-2554310 who then referred me to Jane Hart in planning and permits. She is in zoning and explained to me as long as there was no structure such as a dock or a seawall there was no permit needed to shore up the edge of the pond with rocks and burlap and plants.

Her contact number is 321-633-2070.

I hope this is what you required.

Sadly, I will be unavailable to make this Thursday's meeting. However, Jules and I will strive to gather plants next week. I have also reached out to the people who owned the pond at the library and asked if I could harvest some white lilies. I have yet to hear back from them."

Dick wants the committee input to be able to move forward with landscaping improvements of common areas. There are twelve designated common areas that the HOA is responsible for. Any improvements will need to be within the budget. There was \$2,100 not spent last year (mulching not done) and so the mulching that was recently done at the front entrance used that funding.

Jules H. has rendered a plan for the front entry and we need to take it into consideration in the planning.

1. We need to select a palette of plants for the whole neighborhood, create a brochure or document that will be available to the residents and posted on the website.

Center Island Discussion:

Concerns:

1. The area has poor soil and has roots from the large trees, (one still there and one already taken down)
2. The area has underground electrical and irrigation systems that need to be carefully worked around.
3. If we do a raised bed all around, is that too costly? We would need to get bids to determine if that's the route we want to take.
4. Do we hire a company to do the work? Part of the work? Allow volunteers to work with them?
5. Maintenance of the area – with Florida Friendly principles, we should be choosing plantings that take minimum work, less irrigation etc.
6. Several years ago, Beth A. and others went to Rockledge Gardens, bought plantings, asked Mark to dig holes and bring mulch. They planted the purchased plants and then spread the mulch.
7. What can be done in the short term to make the area look better?
8. What can be done long term?

Ideas included:

1. New sod be placed along the curbing edge for a consistent look rather than the ragged grass we currently have in place.
2. Create a tiered raised bed area in the area. Can be made from landscaping stones.
3. Leave the flowering bush that is directly behind the large tree (from St. Andrews), trim as needed to keep it the same size as it is now.

4. Remove all the ornamental grasses.
5. Use the charts that Meg handed out to select five or so plantings that we would want to see around the whole neighborhood.
6. Be mindful of the rendering Jules has done.

Once the plan is finalized, it will go before the board, a Mod/Arc will be created, and then pricing will be sought.

Group will meet again next Tuesday, February 14 at the board room at 3pm to share choices of plantings.

Special Pond Meeting 3 minutes summary submitted by Meghan Murphy ; Pond Beautification Project July 7 2021 @ 7 PM

1. First, I'd like to thank you all for coming together as a community to discuss the possibility of making a change to the pond management practices in CW.
2. We may not always agree on how things should be done, but we can all agree that we want to live in a great place, protect and improve our properties and continue to be the best value in Suntree.
3. CW has a long history of volunteerism for keeping our neighborhood looking great and our dues low. We have many past and current neighbors to thank for that.
4. The 2020 community feedback survey showed that the landscape and irrigation programs are by far the most important line items for board members to focus on.
5. It also showed that we have a great number of folks willing to come out and work together on projects to benefit the entire community. This is a great example of that.
6. In October 2021 a letter to the HOA from a concerned neighbor was printed in the newsletter prompting other community members to volunteer to help beautify the pond.
7. Then, in November 2021 at the 1st FFL Education meeting with Dr Bonnie Wells, many attendees wanted to prioritize changing the appearance of the pond. "The pond is at the heart of our community, and it is a missed opportunity to increase the aesthetic value of our common areas.
8. On November 9th, 2021 another homeowner and I met with Mike from AWC who was helpful to us in understanding the current management program. We also learned from him that the company offers native planting services and fish stocking. I made repeated attempts while on the BOD to contact AWCs home office regarding these services and got no response.
9. There are currently 28 homeowners on the petition and even more residents of this community who want to see some evidence-based changes in the way our landscape, pond & tree management programs are handled.

10. I have personally spoken with numerous folks in county government, other HOA's, the Viera East CDD, UF/IFAS, Master gardeners and pond and landscape contractors. We have also requested bids from 3 additional contractors for pond maintenance.
11. Every one of them recommends some form of planting to stabilize the pond edge and remove harmful nutrient build up in the water.
12. It's true, there are permitting requirements related to the spraying of chemicals in the pond. But not for planting and harvesting of plant material to maintain the water quality and protect the banks of the pond from erosion.
13. In fact, for all new retention projects, it is required to have a minimum of 5% of the water body planted with aquatic plants.
14. As I understand it, the pond permit requires there to be a 10-foot buffer zone preventing fertilizer and lawn clippings from entering the pond. It is recommended to use deep rooted plants for this purpose. We don't currently have any of those.
15. Some serious considerations were raised at the prior board meeting when the petition was presented:
- 1st Sustainability of the project after current homeowners move on is a realistic concern: Our community should prioritize making informed decisions based on the best available evidence, so those who live here in the future know that it is possible to make changes for the benefit of the community based on current research in addition to homeowner preferences. Things will not remain unchanged forever.
 - 2nd Overgrowth of vegetation may be a concern as well. To control vegetation, you must harvest or spray. It's a choice. However, spraying is not the currently recommended best practice. Plants will decrease and remove nutrient build up over time, but only if you harvest them, Look to Duran golf course for more exemplary pond management practices.
 - 3rd What about the costs?
 - As with every other contract review in the past we will need to get estimates and weigh the value of the options on their merits.
 - First, let's identify the benefits to the community, and then we can develop an RFP for our pond management program if necessary.
