2. Michael Himlie Talks About His Work in Palestine: Feb. 1-18

Michael Himlie, from Harmony, Minnesota, works with Christian Peacemaker Teams (CPT), in Palestine & Israel. CPT is an interfaith organization working in conflict and war zones around the world, committed to building partnerships to transform violence and oppression. Michael graduated from Manchester University in May 2017, majoring in peace studies, with particular interest in philosophy, theology, interpersonal mediation, and nonviolent intervention in Middle Eastern war zones, with a focus on Israel's occupation of Palestine. Through photography and stories, Michael will share of his experiences working in Palestine, what life under



military occupation looks like, the beauties that prevail despite, and how we, as the silent majority can contribute to an end of the occupation.

"How the Bible Came to Be the Bible"

The next course offering from the Ventures in Christian Discipleship program at McPherson (Kan.) College will explore "How the Bible Came to Be the Bible." The Christian Bible is a living document with a rich and spirited history. Our course will trace the Bible's development from its early beginnings as a loose collection of shared texts and resources to its formal adoption as canon at the ecumenical councils of the late 4th century AD. We will observe the way the Christian scriptures merged with the developing Hebrew canon and will follow its on-going transformation through the Latin Vulgate to the Luther Bible and beyond.

The class will be held online **Saturday**, **February 10** at 9 a.m. – 12 p.m. CST and taught by Carol A. Scheppard. Carol is immediate past moderator of the Church of the Brethren Annual Conference and a professor at Bridgewater (Va.) College.

We will collect these at District Conference at South Waterloo in August.


8. Message from the Moderator

A fun fact about myself is that I inhale Amish novels, at the rate of about 10 per month, year after year. Yes, there are that many out there. Authors keep writing them in single volumes, compilations of novellas and series.

Aren't they all the same with minor changes in locations and circumstances? Well, yes and no. Most are coming-of-age stories of young women faced with the choice of living out in the English world with its myriad temptation and marrying within their familiar and comfortable (but limited) community life. Each character, though, has a twist that complicates the choice: like a controlling family (Will the father stop the marriage?), a hidden ailment (Will he still love her if he finds out she can't bear a child?) or a yearning for higher education (Will she have to forgo her interest in becoming a veterinarian to stay in the community?).

Most are easy reads, but quite well written. Descriptions of Pennsylvania Dutch meals make my mouth water. Recipes are often included. Between the lines, authors infuse their favorite sayings ("The good stuff lies on the other side of fear.") and philosophies of life ("We are all just people in training." Shelley Shepard Gray), which I find quite applicable to my own. I recently participated in the **A Place of Refuge: Ministry in an Urban Context** Immersion Experience Centered at City of Refuge Ministries in Atlanta, Georgia. This was an experience that I cannot begin to explain. Since my return I have been working on the requited reflection paper and as I have been doing this unpacking and debriefing I could not help but notice the themes of Leadership. Below are just a few of my thoughts that I pray you find helpful as you think about leadership in your context.

They may be a bit disjointed but Laura and I would like to hear from you all about your 2018 Leadership musing and perhaps these reflections will peak your creative thoughts and musings.

Those of us in Church leadership are called to be teaching, modeling, mentoring... Discipleship, this was a recurring theme. What does this mean in your setting?

One of the required readings; *Radical Discipleship: a Liturgical Politics of the Gospel, Jennifer M. McBride* really resonated with me.

Below is a portion of the promo for the book from Amazon:

Christians must become disciples of, not simply believers in, Jesus. Discipleship is radical as Christians take seriously the Jesus of the Gospels.

A definition for Discipleship shared during the class:

Discipleship-Culturing the skills and the Character of Christ in his followers through practices at the intersection of Word, world, and worship. We need to switch from Religion to Discipleship. I do not know anything more important for us as leaders than to teach, model, mentor...Discipleship.

12. A Message from the Child Sexual Abuse Prevention Task Force

Dear Friends,

On January 12, Randy Johnson, former pastor at Dallas Center COB, agreed to a plea bargain regarding child sexual abuse charges, thus avoiding a trial. Sentencing is scheduled for early March.

As a District Task Force charged with heightening our awareness of, and response to, child sexual abuse, we grieve the reality of harm done to the child victim, to other family members, to the Dallas Center congregation, their community, and to the wider Church of the Brethren. We recognize that this erodes trust in the integrity of all pastors, making their difficult work even harder. It affects how people view the Church of the Brethren, and may reinforce negative feelings towards all communities of faith and their leaders. Finally, situations like this often trigger painful memories for survivors, reopening past wounds of abuse and betrayal.

We cannot change what has happened. However, we can use this as an opportunity to recommit ourselves to the wellbeing of children and vulnerable people among us. We can work harder to make our buildings and programs safer and better designed for prevention and care. We can train our pastors, education workers, counselors, parents, and all church members to recognize potential problems and initiate helpful interventions. We can deepen our understanding about Biblical and theological resources that challenge abusive power. We can believe children when they tell us of harm, and reach out with care to those who carry burdens of past abuse.

Many pastors in our district participated in our appeal to preach about child abuse in January. If your congregation missed this, the month of April, with its focus upon child abuse awareness and prevention, offers another opportunity for this emphasis. Our plan as a Task Force is to gather and make these sermons available as a resource and collective act of accountability, education, and hope.

In anticipation of a safer, more aware and just church, we offer this prayer:

Gracious and Loving God.

We come to you with heavy hearts for the harm that has been committed, trust betrayed and vulnerability violated. We pray for all of those whose lives have been diminished by the pain of abuse; may they find peace in your presence, and courage to face each day with dignity and strength.

In this time of challenge, we give thanks for systems of justice and law that seek accountability and protection of the most vulnerable among us. Guide us, we pray, as we seek to do our part to be trustworthy communities of compassion, reconciliation, and safety.

We offer this prayer in the name of Jesus, who understands and heals. Amen.
