Dear Church Family and Friends,

During every election campaign, there exists a range of both positive and negative emotions: enthusiasm, excitement, and hope on the one hand, skepticism, anxiety, doubt, disappointment, and dread on the other. In my lifetime, I've experienced both the cheers and tears of folks around me after the final counts were tallied, having been registered as both a Republican and Democrat. My parents represented both parties, too.

But this general election campaign has been like none other and not only the candidates and their running mates are to blame. The news media and famous people certainly play their part. And there seems to be more pacs (political action campaigns) these days able to afford lots of advertising and opportunities to say things that

candidates may or may not approve of. The disclaimer quoted is that they are "not responsible for the contents."

There has been an inordinate amount of unkind speech. During the start of both conventions, bright glimmers of hope and positivity quickly grew dim as shadows of mean-spirited talk crept in. Inner conflict, turmoil and generalized anxiety are only some of the negative effects of exposure to all this catastrophizing: dwelling on scenarios describing worst possible outcomes.

Jesus understood that humans have limited capacity for hearing about scenarios that threaten to disrupt their way of life. He told his disciples that he understood their inability to absorb the news of upcoming big changes. He prepared them with only necessary facts without intending to excite, upset, or instill fear. He only had their best interests in mind.

Each candidate's message has triggered people's primitive brain and traveled upon the most basic tracks of the human nervous system. Each has compelled our instincts: Avoid your worst fear. Cling to what makes you feel safe and increases the likelihood of survival. Hold fast to your personal values and preferences because much is at stake. Prepare yourself for not only big changes, but losses should you make the wrong choice/cast your vote or fail to cast your vote.

Every major historical event is a reminder of how God created both us and the earth to experience the constant of change, to learn as we evolve and adapt, to become new as we encounter endings and beginnings, to transform ourselves and our environment, as needed. I have confidence in our system of democracy, in the fabric of our country, in the people who will vote (or have voted) according to their consciences, at the behest of their hearts and minds.

I trust that God will work through not only those who hold office or are in positions of power, but that God will continue to work through ordinary citizens: those who do the best they can day after day, who put in effort to provide for themselves and those they love. Politicians can't be all bad. Even Jesus chose to surround himself with loyal followers for moral support and to further his (albeit heavenly) agenda.

Whatever you do, don't forget the aim of God/Jesus' campaign message and mission: To alter the course of history through the actions of everyday life. The goal being: to provide the means necessary for people to relate to each other lovingly, to make it possible for everyone to feel whole, accepted by God and neighbor.

Jesus was all about facilitating the opportunity to improve a life and deepen important relationships so that everyone/all ages felt cared for. He made a point of suggesting that those who had more should be more responsible for those who could not care for themselves.

My prayer is for everyone to do what they can to make the world a better place, for each to be held accountable for pursuing godly virtues and upholding Christian values, that we will learn to understand and desire to learn from those motivated by different beliefs for the sake of living

in peace and the hope of prosperity for all that God has created.

Whatever the outcome of the next big challenge we face as individuals or a country, we have every reason to hope in God's plan to constantly renew and redeem the world, to make good things come from bad and to fulfill the promise/guarantee that evil won't win.

ST. PETER'S ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

On October 13th, St. Peter held its annual congregational meeting during which the congregation approved St. Peter's budget as well as the 2024 joint church budget. Sallianne Bechtel was elected to Council and one more person is needed to replace the two persons going off at the end of this calendar year: President Diane Keister and Nicole Miller (who will continue to serve as Treasurer). The congregation also voted for Bruce Keister's name to be added to the "appreciation plaque".

MESSIAH ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

On October 27th, Messiah held its annual congregational meeting with 41 voting members in attendance. All proposed budget expenses were approved after some discussion about line items related to replacement of sidewalks, scouting, additional monies for outreach, missionary support and memorial funds. Dawn Pellman agreed to fill the council vacancy once Kyle Hoffman finishes out his second 3-yr term at year's end. And Madison Crum-Burger agreed to serve his second 3-yr term. The names of David Wright and Stephen Blades were unanimously approved to be added to the church's appreciation plaque. Work to replace sidewalks begins 10/28/24.

DECEMBER IS NATIONAL STRESS-FREE HOLIDAY MONTH

Here are some tips to manage your stress levels during National Stress-free Holiday Month

Major Depressive Disorder with a Seasonal Pattern:

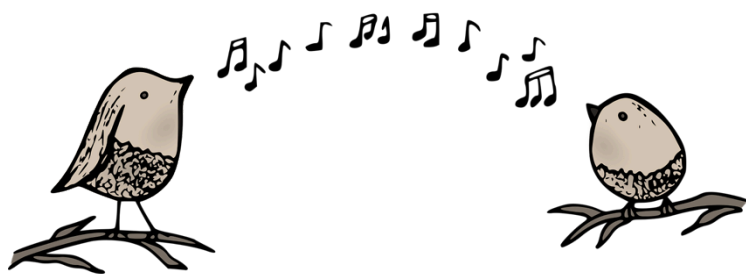

Please enjoy the following simple labyrinth. Directions: Before you begin, think of someone or something that's been on your mind. Ask God a question; ask yourself a question; think of what's weighing on your heart. You can also try repeating a line of scripture while moving between the lines. Start to slowly trace the empty space inside the labyrinth shape starting from the outside going toward the center. Use a finger or object that won't leave a mark while meditating or in prayer. Pause at the center. Without breaking contact, return to the starting point. A labyrinth is not a maze, not a Ouija board or magic. It's simply a contemplative exercise that can calm your brain, invite God's peace and encourage holy dialogue. Hope it works for you, helps you connect inwardly with God and opens your mind up for spiritual conversation. PNB
