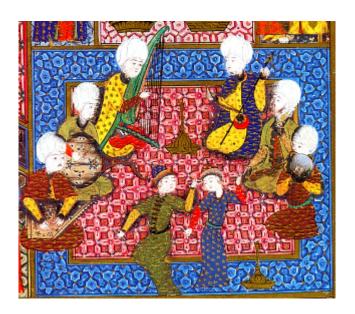

1800 PERFORMANCE: El Parnaso Hyspano: San Francisco Xavier: An Indigenous Baroque Opera

The Jesuit missions of South America were the source of a very large number of musical compositions, some by Jesuit musicians, but many more by Indigenous composers, who did not sign their names. All the compositions had one thing in common, they were written for indigenous people to sing and play. Members of El Parnaso Hyspano, an Hispanic early music ensemble, will give the first UK performance of one of the most significant of these anonymous works, the 40-minute opera, San Francisco Xavier, written in the Chiquitano language in the early 18th century. It is the first known opera to be written in an indigenous language.

This concert performance will be framed by a panel discussion of some of the issues around authenticity and respect for Indigenous traditions and culture when approaching such music in a contemporary Western context.

The concert is offered as part of York's Festival of Ideas, and is generously supported by the University of York's Centre for Indigenous and Settler Colonial Studies, the Centre for Renaissance and Early Modern Studies, the Department of History and the Department of English and Related Literature.
