## FARMWISE Background and Goals

The Association of State Public Health Nutritionists (ASPHN), in cooperation with USDA, is administering the Farm to Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP): Win for Farmers, Students, and Educators (FARMWISE) program. The goal of FARMWISE is to advance state-level Farm to CACFP initiatives to increase access to healthy environments and local foods for all young children. For more information on CACFP, visit <https://www.fns.usda.gov/cacfp>.

Ten state Farm to CACFP coalitions will participate in FARMWISE. FARM to CACFP coalitions may be a subgroup of state Farm to ECE or Farm to School coalitions. These ten FARMWISE coalitions will participate in an enriching multi-year program, which includes annual FARMWISE Institutes, TA, networking, virtual learning opportunities, as well as funding for a subset of 3 coalitions to support travel and implementation materials. All FARMWISE coalitions will work on expanding Farm to CACFP by building programmatic capacity, increasing program awareness, establishing Farm to CACFP supportive policies, systems, and environments, and strengthening intrastate collaborations, which will lead to sustained and equitable Farm to CACFP programs. Increasing Farm to CACFP statewide will increase local procurement by ECEs participating in CACFP, expand young children's access to healthy food, promote lifelong healthy eating habits, and create a cohort of young children primed for successful Farm to School programs.

There will be an in-person FARMWISE Institute the week of **November 18, 2024** (location TBD). All coalition members are invited to participate. The Turnip the Beet Track Coalitions are required to send a minimum of 4 members. This travel needs to be accounted for in the FARMWISE budget and budget narrative ([see linked template](#)) with a breakdown of travel costs by transportation costs, registration costs, per diem, hotel costs, and number of travelers. We recommend including a minimum of \$1,800 pp for travel to cover travel costs for the required attendance at the Institute. Coalitions wanting to bring more members to the meeting are welcome to but should not exceed \$10,800 in travel costs.
