SCIENCE - Mrs. Dail

I hope you all had a fabulous fall break and took some time to enjoy your family! This week we continue to wrap up our animal unit! Today we began focusing on adaptations of owls, and specifically how these adaptations aid in their hunting of prey. After becoming more familiar with the owl, we set up for dissecting our own owl pellets. Tomorrow we will begin to separate the bones to piece together the skeleton from the pellet as we try to identify the prey found in each pellet. We will interrupt our dissection for the second part of our adaptation webquest on Thursday and a recycling investigation on Friday. We will discuss how humans have to change our behaviors as our habitats change. We specifically will be talking about recycling and landfills. We will try our hands at guessing how long it takes some everyday items to decompose. You would be amazed how long it takes for some items to decompose. Ask your child about it! We will return to wrap up our owl pellet investigation next week.

This week as we are wrapping up our animal unit, each night students should be studying their study guides (as well as animal vocabulary)! Please review these each night with your child - they are growing in independence but studying is a

difficult skill! They still need your help! **Our animal unit test will be <u>Thursday</u> 10/30**. Students should be studying each evening since we finished the study guide as it will be assigned homework each evening.

As I mentioned in our last newsletter - I keep my study guide key on the corner of my desk for students to check if needed.
