Jason Schmidt: Thanks for taking time out of your day to help us understand a little bit more about this upcoming referendum on April six so.

Jason Schmidt: I guess, first of all let's spend a little bit of time talking about what specifically is the question that is being brought to the Community, and what are like what specifically are we are really looking for that that community to vote on in this referendum.

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Dean Hess: You bet and one of the things that i'll throw it right in the beginning, is all of the information, or at least a huge majority of the information we're talking about today.

Dean Hess: People can actually access this right on our kind of falls website and i'm actually on there right now and i'll just read the question real quick.

Dean Hess: Shall the school board of the kind of falls public school district be authorized to exceed the revenue limit that it gives a statute over the next five years, beginning in the 2122 school year in the amount of \$3.3 million, which is the amount that is sun setting in.

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Dean Hess: In our current referendum, and it talks about that it would increase by 270,270 \$5,000 each year between.

Dean Hess: And then ending and sustaining at \$4.4 million in the 2526 school year and thereafter, and the purpose of this is maintaining current programs and services.

Dean Hess: Funding building maintenance competitive staff compensation expanding course offerings and additional building security improvements, so it gives you a flavor of the why we're going for it.

Dean Hess: And again it's replacing \$3.3 million referendum that is scheduled to sunset right now in.

Dean Hess: we're asking for a 275,000 increase each year for the first five years and then it sustains at 4.4 million and to put that in perspective \$275,000 is just a little bit more than half of what we've been increasing.

Dean Hess: And the idea behind that we've been doing a lot of deferred maintenance with our buildings and grounds, as well as with our technology infrastructure with our transportation.

Dean Hess: Such that we feel we can reduce that that annual increase for those first five years and that's based on the fiscal planning that we've been doing.

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Jason Schmidt: So to sum it up, then this is a this question that's going to be posed to the Community is to replace in a referendum that has already been existing since 2017 so we're in year four.

Jason Schmidt: Have a five year referendum and we're replacing that now or asking the Community to replace that.

Jason Schmidt: With a with another referendum, and then this one would be a recurring referendum, as opposed to the previous one, which was non recurring So could you talk a little bit about the difference between those two.

Dean Hess: Absolutely, and in our the communities that we serve.

Dean Hess: They approved a non recurring referendum back in 2014 and at that time they approved it for three years and that was for \$400,000 each year when that were non recurring referendum sunset in 2017 we went back to the communities that we serve and a little bit of history behind that.

Dean Hess: We were in a situation in 2015 16 we recognized, we were going to have more than a \$500,000 deficit and we had to do some significant layoffs.

Dean Hess: In 2016 in order to balance our budget and those layoffs were in areas such as agriculture, art English Fayyad French tech head choir as well as core structure and elementary and middle school.

Dean Hess: And in 2017 we ran a referendum and we explained to the communities that we serve if that had not passed, we would have had to made again some really significant cuts in our programming.

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Dean Hess: The communities that we serve past a five year non recurring referendum, and that non recurring is critical to understand, basically, what it says we're going to support you for a specific period of time, then we want you to come back and give us an update on where we're at.

Dean Hess: In that situation if funding for public school has changed and you're able to get more funding, you can potentially move forward without a referendum.

Dean Hess: Unfortunately, we haven't had any significant changes to the funding of public education and therefore we are happy to come back as we had shared with the communities that we serve back in in 2017 when we when we brought this forward.

Dean Hess: we've increased the amount by \$500,000 each year and the reasoning behind that is we've not only been dealing with trying to address the deferred maintenance, the deferred transportation, the deferred tech infrastructure, but then also we've been.

Dean Hess: Addressing other aspects of operations and now at \$3.3 million again if the non recurring referendum were not to be replaced, we would need to make three plus million dollars worth of cuts in our current budget in order to balance the budget.

Dean Hess: that's what we call a fiscal cliff.

Dean Hess: people that have been involved in watching board meetings over the last few years know that if we did not have a need for the fiscal resource, it was reinvested back into the school district, and so we have a healthier fund balance today than we did four years ago.

Dean Hess: Improvement needs we have approximately a million dollars in our fun 46 so as we start to replace doors and windows and roofs.

Dean Hess: We shared some numbers I don't have right in front of me right now but it's between three and \$400 that the taxes would go down on hundred thousand dollar home and that that is something that i'm fully aware, a lot of folks would say that's very beneficial for a family.

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Dean Hess: specific to their taxes, by the same token it's that same three or \$400 reduction that would cause the three plus million dollar reduction out of the school district budget, so it would have that impact on the individual taxpayer, you would have a three plus million dollar.

Dean Hess: negative impact on the school district budget so ultimately it's going to as it always does go to the taxpayers, for their decisions.
