Course Name:	● Sierra College - PSYC 0100 - General Principles of Psychology / DE Psychology
Course Description:	Introduction to the scientific study of behavior and mental processes. Focuses on exploring major psychological theories and concepts, methods, and research findings in psychology. Topics include the biological bases of behavior, perception, cognition, and consciousness, learning, memory, emotion, motivation, development, personality, social psychology, psychological disorders and therapeutic approaches, and applied psychology (CSU, UC)

Course Objectives and Student Learner Outcomes:	Psychology 100 ● Using knowledge of research methods (e.g., experimental, correlational, case study) and ethical guidelines, evaluate the scientific evidence for psychological claims. ● Apply and critique psychology's major perspectives (e.g., behavioral, biological, cognitive, evolutionary, humanistic, psychodynamic, and sociocultural) as they relate to behavior and mental processes. ● Demonstrate knowledge and understanding representing breadth and depth in several content areas of psychology (e.g., but not limited to): 1) research methods; 2) biological bases of behavior and mental processes; 3) sensation; 4) perception; 5) cognition; 6) social processes

Course Assignment and Evaluation	A student will be evaluated/weighted on the following basis: 📖 Smartbook, and Connect Homework Assignments: (20%) These assignments are skill-building interactives that provide feedback on expected student learning outcomes. ● Homework readings with textbook Connect questions are assigned nightly. ● Review Smartbook Assignments are assigned before Chapter quizzes. ● The assignment due dates are posted and expected to be submitted on time. ● Missing or late Smartbook, Connect Assignments, and Projects cannot be submitted late or made up for points. They are assigned to support learning and assessments. Please plan or contact me ahead of any due dates if there is a conflict with the assignment submission. 📖 Quizzes: (20%) Each Chapter's material will be assessed to provide information on the student's learning. ● Approximately 10 Quizzes are given over the term; please expect one every week

	• The quizzes typically cover the most recent material, but can combine recent and review topics. • A missed quiz will result in a score of 0. The only time to make up a quiz is with <u>prior arrangements in advance</u>. The quiz can be made up the day before the assigned quiz during <u>intervention</u>. The two lowest quiz scores will be dropped. 📌 Exams/Assessments/Projects: (60%) Exams are based on 3-4 chapters of readings and material presented in class. • Approximately *5 Exams will be given throughout the semester and will be based on the information found in the textbook and presented in class. • The exams will be both multiple-choice and a short writing prompt. • There are NO make-up exams. An absence/missed exam will result in a score of 0 for that exam unless prior arrangements are <u>made in advance</u>. 📌 Cell phones, smartwatches, earbuds, or smartglasses are NOT allowed during exams, quizzes, or any other assessment, and you will not be able to leave the room during an exam.
Grading Scale:	Graded work will receive a numeric score reflecting the quality of performance as given above in evaluation methods. The overall course grade will be determined according to the following scale: *I do not round up. **DO grades will be the same as Sierra's, except for a 97%, which will result in an A+ on the Del Oro (DO) transcript. • A= 90% - 100% • B= 80% - 89% • C = 70% - 79% • D = 60% - 69% • F < Below 59% *DE Psychology has a weighted GPA bump for your Del Oro transcript (5-point scale; A=5.0, B=4.0, & C=3.0 GPA)
