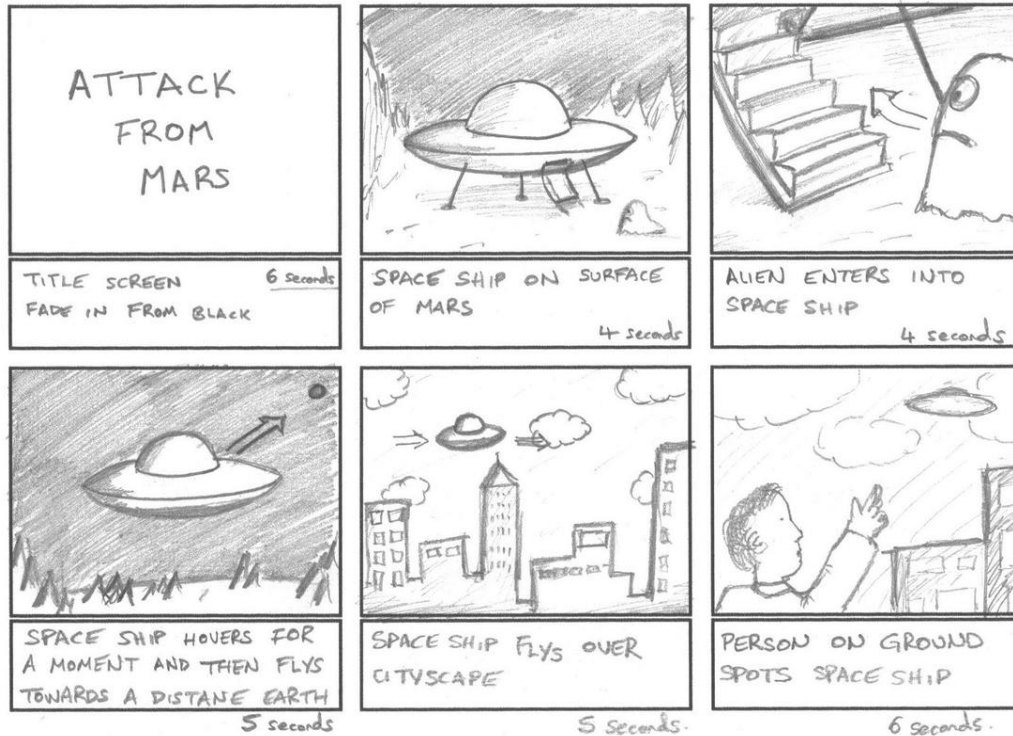


Hero's Journey Storyboard

A storyboard shows snapshots of what happens at each step of a story. Storyboards are made before virtually every animated or real-life movie you have ever seen. Storyboard drawings are not polished works of art, but rather, they show the background and the most important thing happening. This is an important step for you to plan your crankie background scroll, so make sure that you keep the crankie format and your scroll (as well as your shadow puppet(s)) in mind when you plan out what each scene will look like on your storyboard. I REPEAT, these should not be polished works of art, but more like rough drafts of what will eventually go onto your background scroll next week. Use your planning sheets from last week as a guide.

Examples of storyboards from non-crankie projects:

Young man standing in front of his date's door ringing the bell and holding a bouquet of roses.

We see the two sitting intimately at a small table in an ice-cream shop, while sharing an ice cream-foaf. They are clearly in love.
