Art Therapy Pre-Professional Pathway



Students who are interested in a career in art therapy/mental health counseling will need to apply to graduate school to obtain the needed coursework and to be eligible for state licensure. The track outlined below addresses foundational knowledge and skills that will best prepare you for graduate school work and success in art therapy. Students who pursue the Art Therapy track must major in Psychology and minor in Studio Art.
