GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS

The maximum length of a paper is 10 pages, single-spaced, justified, using 11-point Times New Roman regular font, and a two-column format. The paper should be A4 (210 x 297 mm) with left, top, right, and bottom margins of 30 mm, 25 mm, 25 mm, and 25 mm, respectively. The header and footer should be 15 mm and 13 mm, respectively. The spacing between columns should be 5 mm. The beginning of each paragraph should be indented 10 mm. All foreign terms should be italicized.

The paper should be structured according to the topic headings: Introduction, Literature Review, Methods, Results and Discussion, Conclusion, Acknowledgements (if any), and References. The topic headings should be formatted in 11-point bold, all capital letters, and should not be numbered sequentially and should be left-aligned. Example: RESULTS AND DISCUSSION. The format for writing sub-topic titles is 11 pt, bold, capitalized at the beginning of each word, and numbered sequentially. Example: 4.1 Test Results. The format for writing sub-subtopic titles is the same as for writing sub-topic titles. Example: 4.1.1 The Influence of Variables. At the end of the topic, sub-topic, and sub-sub-topic section, a single space is provided before writing the next discussion. There is no space between the topic, sub-topic, and sub-sub-topic titles and the text below them.

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PREPARATION INSTRUCTIONS**Writing Equations**

Equations are written using 11-point font size with the equation number placed in parentheses at the end of the right margin. Equations are written with a single space between them.

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$$A = \frac{1}{2} \pi r^2 \quad (1)$$

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Presentation of Figures and Tables

The table title is written above the table on the left side and numbered sequentially in bold. There is no space between the table title and the table. The table is centered, consisting of only three horizontal lines, with one line above the table header, one line flanking it, and one line at the very bottom of the table content. There is a single space between the table and the text below it, as before.

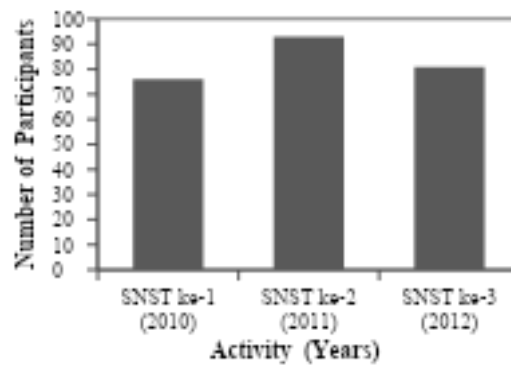

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Figures are centered with the serial number and figure title placed below the figure. The distance between the figure and the figure title is single-spaced, as is the distance between the figure title and the text below it. Figure titles are written in bold and centered. If tables or figures are taken from other sources or are not the result of the author's research, the source of the quotation must be included.

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Writing Citation (*USE MENDELEY*)

The Harvard system for writing excerpts/citations of a manuscript or literature uses the Harvard system. The bibliographic sources listed in the description only include the author's last name and the year of publication. Example: Much research has been conducted to classify wear, including the use of wear maps.(Hsu and Shen, 2005 *for one or two authors*; Adachi et al., 1997 *for more than two authors*). According to Pasaribu (2005), wear on ceramics... etc. Writing of citation sources is without serial numbers, left aligned on the first line and indented 10 mm for the second line and so on. There are no spaces between citation sources. The following are 7 examples of writing a bibliography written in alphabetical order and sequentially are examples for: (1) writing scientific journals/proceedings, (2) websites, (3) textbooks, (4) handbooks, (5) papers in a book chapter, (6) dissertations, and (7) patents.
