

## Title: The Title Should be Short, Clear, and Informative, but Does not Exceed 20 words

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### ABSTRACT

A single paragraph of about 250 words maximum. For research articles, abstracts should give a pertinent overview of the work. We strongly encourage authors to use the following style of structured abstracts, but without headings: (1) Background: Place the question addressed in a broad context and highlight the purpose of the study; (2) Purpose of the Study: Identify the purpose and objective of the study; (3) Methods: Describe briefly the main methods or theoretical framework applied; (4) Results: Summarize the article's main findings; and (5) Conclusions: Indicate the main conclusions or interpretations.

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### INTRODUCTION

The introduction should briefly place the study in a broad context and highlight why it is important. It should define the purpose of the work and its significance. The current state of the research field should be reviewed carefully, and key publications cited. Please highlight controversial and diverging hypotheses when necessary. Finally, briefly mention the main aim of the work and highlight the principal conclusions. As far as possible, please keep the introduction comprehensible to scientists outside your particular field of research. References should be cited as (Kamba, 2018) or (Marchlewska et al., 2019) or (Cichocka, 2016; Hidayat & Khalika, 2019; Ikhwan, 2019; Madjid, 2002) or (Miller & Josephs, 2009, p. 12) or Rakhmat (1989). See the end of the document for further details on references. Technical terms should be defined. Symbols, abbreviations, and acronyms should be defined the first time they are used. All tables and figures should be cited in numerical order.

## METHODS

The research method should be included in the Introduction. The method contains an explanation of the research approach, subjects of the study, the conduct of the research procedure, the use of materials and instruments, data collection, and analysis techniques.

## RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

The results and discussion section presents the research findings and the scientific analysis of the obtained data. The presentation should be systematic and aligned with the research objectives or research questions.

### 1. Results

- a. **Research results** should be presented clearly, concisely, and objectively. Data may be displayed in the form of tables, figures, graphs, or relevant interview excerpts.
- b. **Authors** are advised not to repeat all information contained in tables or figures in the narrative, but instead highlight the main findings of the study.

All tables and figures must be numbered consecutively and provided with clear titles. Data sources should be included when necessary.

### 2. Discussion

- a. **The discussion** section contains the interpretation and analysis of the research findings.
- b. **Authors** should explain the meaning of the findings, the factors influencing the results, and their relationship to relevant theories and previous studies.

The discussion should demonstrate:

- **The relationship between findings and theory;**
- **Similarities or differences with previous studies;**
- **The contribution or novelty of the research;**
- **Theoretical and practical implications of the findings.**

The discussion should be analytical and argumentative rather than merely descriptive. Relevant and recent scholarly references should be used to strengthen the analysis.

## CONCLUSION

The conclusion should answer the objectives of the research and research discoveries. The concluding remark should not contain only the repetition of the results and discussions or abstract. You should also suggest future research and point out those that are underway.

## REFERENCES

The reference list should contain only sources cited in the manuscript and must be written consistently according to the citation style required by the target journal. Authors are encouraged to use relevant, recent, and reputable scholarly sources from both national and international publications.

References should meet the following criteria:

- All references and citations in the manuscript must follow APA style consistently.
- At least 70% derived from scientific journal articles;
- At least 50% of the references should come from reputable international journals;
- A maximum of 50% of the references may come from accredited national journals;
- Prioritize references published within the last 5–10 years;
- Use primary sources relevant to the research topic;
- Authors are encouraged to use reference management software such as Mendeley or Zotero.
