## **ACT English Test**

### **Basic Details**

- It's the first of 4 tests. 45 min 75 Questions
  - **Not** enough time for a minute per question. For some, you won't need a minute anyway.
  - The question formats take on **patterns**.
    - The more practice with the types of questions, the better.
    - You will also be more aware of "trick statements" such as "which of these is NOT..."
  - Contet: 2 types--Usage/Mechanics and Rhetorical Devices
    - Usage/Mechanics: Punctuation; Grammar; Syntax (sentence structure)
    - Rhetorical Devices: Writing strategies; Organization; Style (appropriate word or phrase)

### **General Advice**

- The English test is to cover that which you should already know--you are asked to apply the rules of grammar and writing.
- Everything that is NOT underlined is assumed to be correct.
- You will do a combination of reading the questions and passages at the same time.
- If you can't get the answer relatively quickly, note it and move on.
- You are **not penalized** for guessing. So, FILL IN EVERY BUBBLE!
  - Eliminate answers that you know are wrong.
- Redundancy (unnecessary repetition) is a big deal; go for the *shortest answer*.
- Sentence fragments are *never* the right answer.
  - What do you need to make a sentence? Subject and Predicate (verb)
- If something sounds wrong, it likely could be. Take the time to "say" the answer in your head (of course).
- Don't be afraid of the answer "NO CHANGE." About 30% of the time it is correct!

## Top 10 Rules

### Run-Ons and Fragments.

- o If a sentence is lacking a subject and our predicate, then it is a *fragment*. This is incorrect.
- o If a sentence has two (or more) independent clauses put together without appropriate punctuation, then it is called a *run-on*. This is also incorrect.

## Verbs--subject/verb agreement and verb tenses.

- Find the subject of the sentence and make sure the verb matches it.
- Note--the ACT tests on all forms of verbs: past, present, future, past perfect, present perfect, future perfect tenses.

## Punctuation.

- Commas
- Apostrophes
- Colons
- Semicolons
- Dashes
- Periods
- Question Marks
- Exclamation Points

#### Idioms.

• These are expressions native to the English language. You will be tested on knowing the appropriate format for the more common ones.

# Wordiness.

Again, go for the shorter answer, and keep it simple.

## Parallel Structure

• When items are in a series, make sure they are in the same form.

#### Pronouns.

- Pronouns must have a clear antecedent.
  - Mrs Larson = She
    - Mrs Larson (antecedent) She (pronoun)
- o If the antecedent is unclear, the noun needs to be put into the sentence.

# Modifiers: Adjectives, Adverbs, and Modifying phrases.

- Modifiers are words or phrases that describe things.
  - Adverbs modify verbs
  - Adjectives modify nouns
  - Be aware that many sentences start with a modifying phrase followed by a comma.
    - The subject following must be the thing being modified.

## Word Choice.

- You will be tested on the most precise word choice.
  - There will be one correct answer.

# Organization and Strategy.

- You will be asked questions about the order and focus of sentences or paragraphs.
- You will be asked about adding, revising, or deleting sentences.
- You will be asked how a sentence fits with the audience, purpose, and focus of a paragraph as a whole.
