Notes:

Why memoir?

- Teacher must be guided by the needs and interests of her students *at that time*.
- Memoir is powerful because it helps connect our individual, unique experiences.
 - This develops writing communities.

Teaching memoir

- Have some experience with writing a memoir before teaching it, but continue to learn with students as you go.
- Workshop model: begin with minilesson in which an issue is raised, move to demonstrating a skill or strategy, then focus students on a writer’s technique. Finish with individual conferences.
- Immerse students in the genre: they need to read it in order to write it.
- Begin unit by defining and classifying memoir.
- Effective minilessons are crucial: focus on hooks and titles, sensory details, “shape” or form/structure, conclusion.
- Brainstorming is very important, but can sometimes be met with pushback—come up with strategies to get their brains moving; such as, “Who Am I?” Charts.
- Encourage planning, but be weary of overemphasizing it.

Classroom format when teaching memoir

- Importance of choice in choosing a topic to write about in the form of the genre.
- Must create a safe, supportive writing environment first because memoir starts with honesty; vulnerability.
- Discuss the risks that need to be taken in order to write the best memoir you can.
