

DSWD DROMIC Report #24 on Tropical Storm “BASYANG” (I.N. SANBA) as of 02 March 2018, 7PM

Situation Overview

On 11 February 2018, 1100H, a Tropical Storm with maximum winds of 55 km/h and gustiness of up to 65 km/h entered the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR). The Tropical Storm, Sanba, was locally named “Basyang”.

It dissipated into a Tropical Depression and left the PAR on 16 February 2018, 1100H.

DROMIC Preparedness for Response Report on the TD is available online at: http://dromic.dswd.gov.ph. An Emergency Response Preparedness (ERP) meeting was conducted today, 1330H at the NDRRMC Operations Center, which was attended by DReAMB staff.

The Fifteen (15) reported EC were all pre-emptive. Local Government Unit of Araceli has distributed food and water to IDPs. As per coordination with PDRRMO and SWADT Office, all rescue teams on standby were ready to be deployed any time. DSWD-FO MIMAROPA closely coordinated with MDRRMO/MSWDO/PDRRMO to effectively monitor the situation and weather disturbance within the affected areas of Palawan. Reported opened evacuation centers were all used for pre-emptive evacuation. This was undergoing validation by the Field Office as to the number of currently open ECs.
