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Course and Course Description Latin II

Latin II is the continued study of the grammar and vocabulary of the Latin language as well as the history, culture, and mythology of the Ancient Romans. Important concepts from Latin I will be reviewed.

Required Materials

Textbooks:

Ecce Romani I/II, Cambridge Latin Course, other materials (texts will stay in the classroom and students will have electronic access to textbooks)

Supplies Needed:

Items to bring to class every day:

interactive notebook (provided by teacher) ChromeBook, *charged* extra loose-leaf paper; pen or pencil

Suggested (optional) items:

index cards (to make vocabulary flash cards) markers, scissors, highlighter, glue stick

I try always to have a classroom supply of anything students will need. I do ask parents, if they are able, to donate one thing for the classroom supply collection. It could be a pack of loose leaf paper, a pack of pencils, dry erase markers, glue sticks, tissues, bottled drinks, or candy/snacks. I also have an Amazon wish list if anyone wants to help with it

Student Attendance Expectations Attendance

 Regular attendance is necessary for success and required by law. A student missing more than 15 minutes of a class is considered absent. Upon the 20th absence for a 1st period class or 10th absence for a block class, a student will lose credit for the class.

Tardiness

- Students are expected to be on time for school and each class. Students not in their assigned class on time each block without a pass are considered to be in an Unauthorized Area.
- Discipline for tardiness will be as follows:
 - > 1st Tardy warning
 - > 2nd Tardy warning and a call home
 - > 3rd tardy and all subsequent tardies office referral

How to study vocabulary:

Flash cards are optional but always encouraged. All vocabulary is available on my quizlet site and you can download a free quizlet app on your phone. From the app, to find my word sets, search for "MagistraLoop" (one word). Other vocabulary study tools will be shared in class.

KINDNESS

We treat each other with compassion, gratitude, and empathy. This includes your classmates, your teacher, your substitute teacher, and any other person you encounter here.

ACCOUNTABILITY

We take personal and social responsibility for our decisions. Regular attendance as well as well as prompt make-up of any missed work is crucial to learning. Bring your charged Chromebook, Latin interactive notebook, pencil/pen, and paper to each class. Know if there is something due or if

- 1. The notebook is a formative quiz grade each 9 weeks. It's easy to get 100% for this grade.
- 2. A google doc with a list of the notebook's contents will be shared with you and updated throughout the year.
- 3. Always bring your notebook to class. If you forget your notebook, take notes on a separate sheet that day and then glue that sheet into your notebook when you get home.
- 4. If you are absent, you may copy (by HAND) any missed hand-written notes from another student. I will provide you any handouts you missed.
- 5. Don't lose your notebook. But if you do, start reconstructing it as soon as possible and let me know so I can help. You may only photocopy from another student's notebook handouts I gave that were photocopied. Anything that is handwritten needs to be copied in your own handwriting. You will get no points for photocopying another student's handwritten work.

Other Guidelines:

- 1. You will be responsible for any information, including assignments and test and quiz date notifications, that are announced in class and/or placed on the daily agenda document. If you are absent, you must check the daily agenda document for your assignments. "Remind" will also be used for class-related communication, but only as a reminder.
- 2. Chromebooks should be brought to class each day, charged.
- 3. Please try not to lose or throw away handouts I give you, as I will probably not have extra copies. Please be diligent about putting necessary papers in your notebook.

we're having a quiz. Write down assignments and/or sign up for Remind. Do your work independently unless the assignment is specifically designated as a group assignment. Be truthful in all of your interactions with your teacher and fellow students.

RESPECT

ENGAGEMENT

We are fully present in every experience and interaction. Contribute positively to the class, without disrupting the learning environment of others. Pay attention at all times and take notes when necessary. Work cooperatively with other students.

Use of Technology:

As we enter this new era of using technology in the classroom, our guiding principles will be: Is the use of technology appropriate? And is the technology being used for instructional purposes? Students may NOT use cell phones during class* unless it is part of a class assignment and by teacher direction. If cell phone use becomes a problem, students will be referred to their administrator.

*If a student has an emergency and needs to contact their parent or otherwise use their phone, they can let me know and step out in the hall to make the necessary communication. I do not expect students to have emergencies very often. Students will also be allowed a few minutes at the end of class and/or possibly in the middle of class to check their phones, depending on the agreement we make as a class.

Summative assignments:

- Let the teacher and students know the level of achievement attained
- Occur at the end of instruction
- Include projects, summative quizzes, tests, papers

Requirements for Honors Students:

<u>Differentiated Instruction and Assessment</u>: Honors students will learn material at a faster pace and at a greater depth than non-Honors students. This difference will be reflected in assignments and tests.

<u>Practicum</u>: Honors students will complete an intensive independent project that will have several phases throughout the school year.

Explanation of Zeroes, e, and MI

- A "0" in the gradebook indicates that the assignment has been graded, but was either not turned in or earned zero credit.
- An "e" in the gradebook indicates the student is exempt from that assignment.
- An "MI" in the gradebook means the assignment was not turned in and currently not calculated in the total average; however, if the assignment is not turned in, a zero will be given.
- Empty spaces in the gradebook indicate that the assignment has not been graded, but soon will be. Empty spaces do not affect a student's grade.

Homework

Written homework will generally not be given, as there are many answers and translations available online, but reviewing vocabulary and other class material should become a regular part of a language student's daily habits, whether specifically directed by the teacher or not. For each set of vocabulary words, students will be required to study the list electronically or create flash cards or an illustration to show that they studied. These options will be shared with students in class.

Extra Credit

Extra credit may occasionally be given for work that goes beyond what is required. Students should not expect to replace missed work or low test scores with extra credit.

Make up Work Policy

- If you are absent from class, even for part of a class, you have make-up work.
- Students should look at the agenda doc for the day(s) they missed and do what they can at home (if it is taking notes or studying vocabulary) and then contact the teacher to arrange make-up.
- All make up work will occur outside of class (either during "engagement" or before or after school).
- Students have six school days after an excused absence to make up their work. Anything completed after the six days will be considered late and will be accepted, but for reduced credit.(See student handbook for details.)

Late Work Policy

- Timely completion of all assignments is required
- Late work will always be accepted, but for reduced credit, usually a letter grade for each day late.
- Students should not wait until they see a "zero" on StudentVue to realize that they have work that is late or needs to be made up after an absence.

 Work missed because of skipping class or an unexcused absence cannot be accepted for credit. Academic detentions will be used as necessary to insure assignment completion.

Latin Club Officers and Class Representatives




Latin Honor Society


