

Meta: To Reset the Tire Pressure Light of your Jeep Wrangler, drive it for 15 minutes after turning your Tire's Air pressure up 3 PSI then down it to normal.

How to Reset Tire Pressure Light Jeep Wrangler [2023 Guide]

Your Jeep Wrangler comes with the Tire Pressure Monitoring System (TPMS) to monitor your tire's air pressure. When your tire pressure is too low, the TPMS warns you, using the Tire Pressure Light next to the steering wheel.

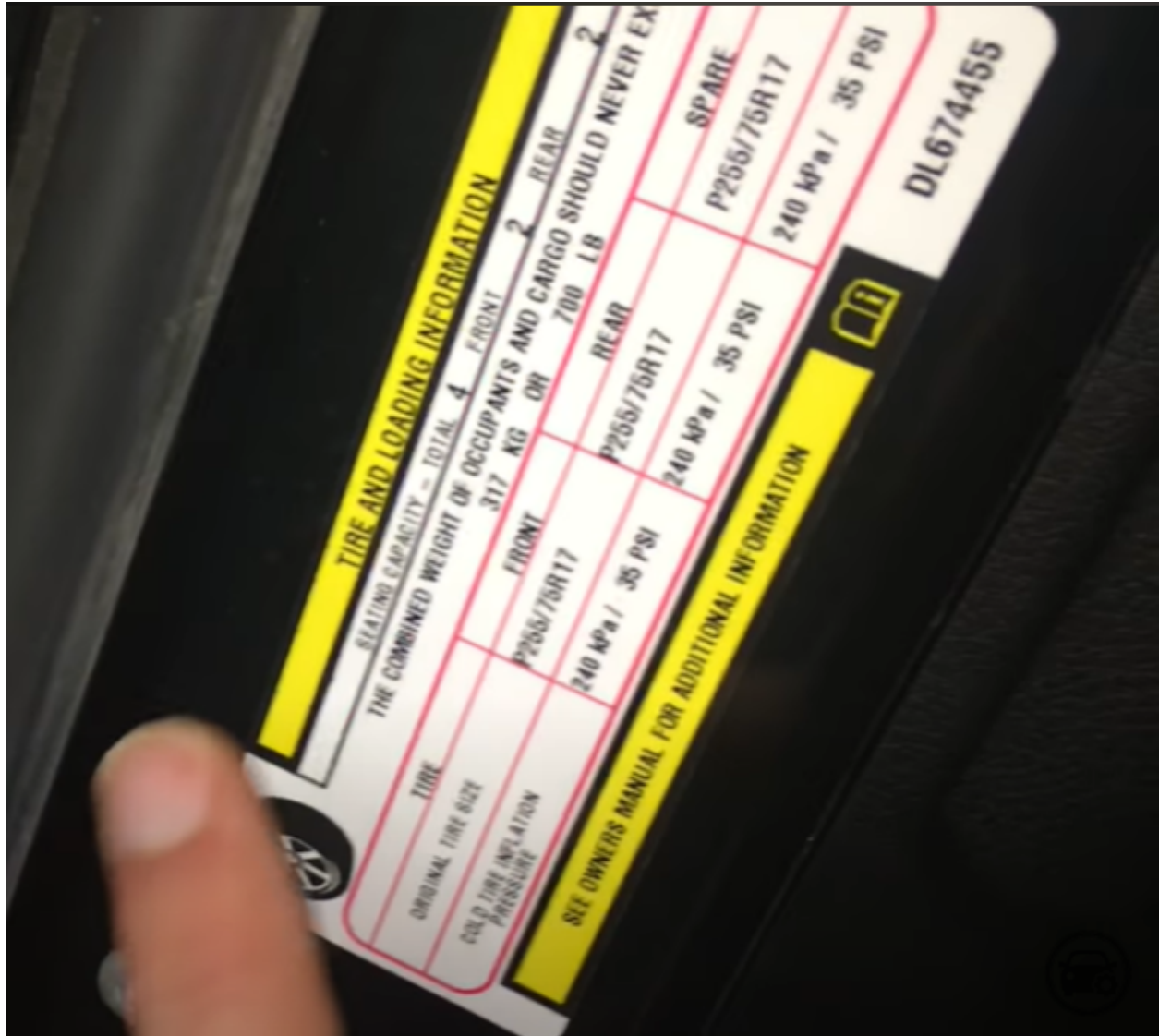
However, sometimes the Tire Pressure Light won't turn off despite having enough air pressure in your Tire. Frustrating! Right? Well, I know this feeling well.

But worry not, you can easily use the Tire Pressure Light of your Jeep Wrangler. **Just ensure all your four tires have recommended PSI, then drive the car for some time. And you're done.**

Why Won't My Wrangler's TPMS Go Off Despite Having The Right Pressure?

Usually, the Tire Pressure Light indicator goes off when you put enough pressure ([35-38 PSI](#)) in your Wrangler's tire. You will find the PSI requirement at the bottom of your Wrangler's left door.



However, sometimes, it won't go off as it should. Here's some reason behind it:

1. Replaced Tire

If you replaced your original tire with aftermarket tires or second-hand ones, the TPMS sometimes wouldn't sync properly with it. And you will face tire pressure light issues with your Jeep.

2. Malfunctioning TPMS

Sometimes the Tire Pressure Monitoring System is damaged while you are driving your Wrangler on rough terrain. When that happens, the pressure light of your wont goes off. But how can you know?

Well, when the pressure light flashes for 50–60 seconds before staying on, that means there's an issue with the TPMS itself, not the tires.

3. System issues

Sometimes after changing your tire, the TPMS won't properly sync with your car's computer. That time the pressure light gives you a false alarm for your tire pressure.

4. Battery Problem

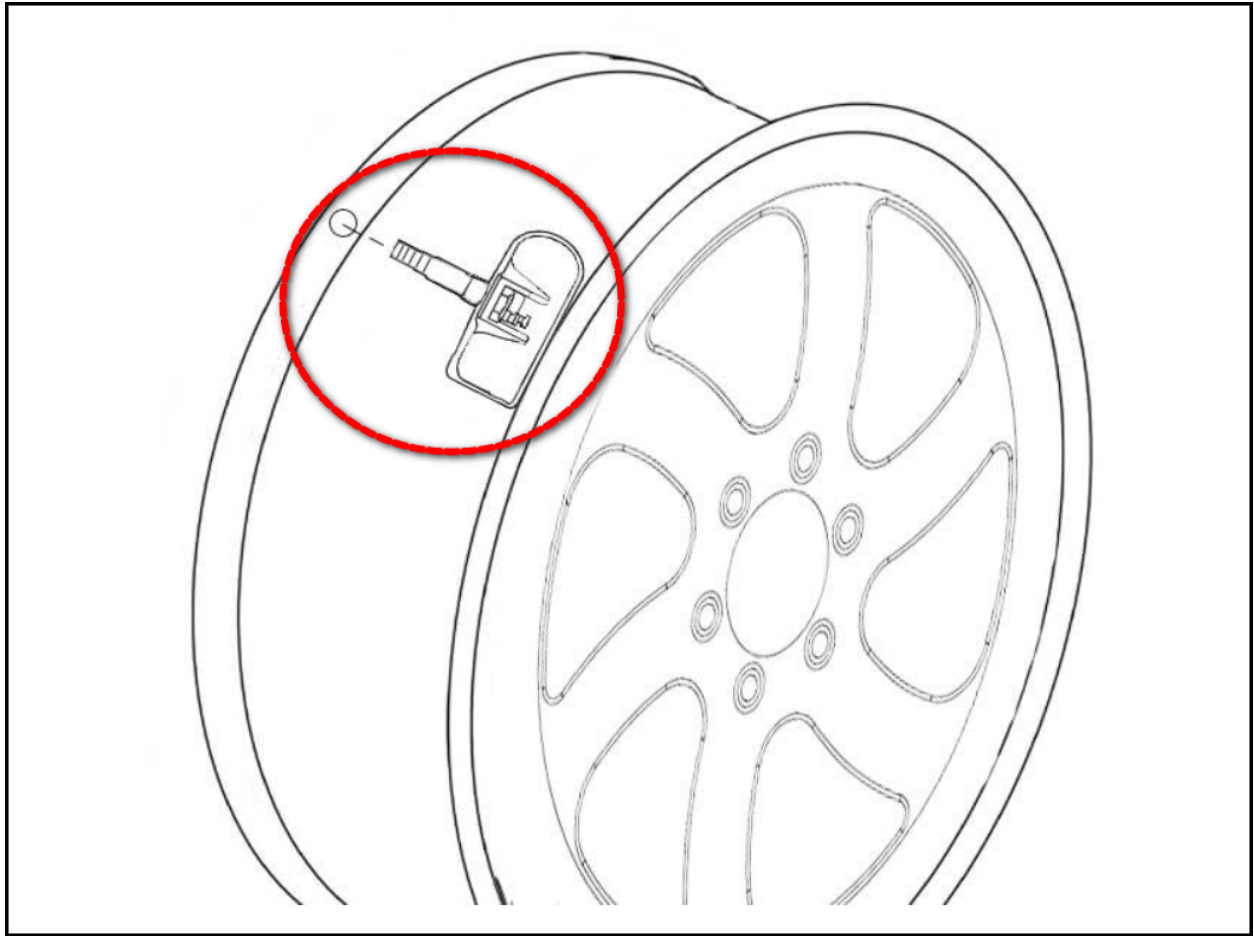
When the battery of your Tire Pressure Monitoring System is dead, It can't send the data properly. At that time, the pressure light won't turn off despite having the right pressure in your tire.

Unfortunately, you can't change the battery of your TPMS, because the battery is embedded in the sensor permanently.

5. Disturbance with Sensor's Radio Waves

Jeep installs the Tire Pressure Monitoring System in [the valve stem inside each tire](#), and they use radio waves to send data to your Wrangler's

computer.

Sometimes those radio signals can't reach the computer for issues like tinted window glasses, tire chains, snow, hailstorm, etc. In That case, the tire pressure light doesn't turn off.

When any of these happens, you need to reset the tire pressure light of your Jeep Wrangler.

But how can you reset the tire pressure indicator in your Jeep Wrangler? Or Does the Jeep Wrangler have a TPMS reset button? Continue reading to know more.

Is There Any TPMS Reset Button In Jeep Wrangler?

Unfortunately, there isn't any reset button in the Tire Pressure Monitoring System of any Jeep Wrangler model. So if the TPMS shows continuous error, you need to replace it.

However, do not jump to a conclusion yet. Though the Jeep Wrangler doesn't have any TPMS Reset switch, there are some steps you can take to reset the tire pressure light before replacing it.

How To Reset Jeep Wrangler Tire Pressure Light

There are some methods to reset the Jeep Wrangler's tire pressure light. You should try them before changing the TPMS sensor. **Here are the solutions:**

Method 1: Reinflate Your Tire's Air

To reset the tire pressure indicator, the first thing you need to do is to put about **3 to 4 PSI** over the recommended value, then drop the pressure to the safety level.

Then the car's tire pressure light will turn back to normal.

Method 2. Drive The Car For 15+ Minutes

Sometimes the TPMS sensor can't recognize the changes in tire pressure right away. In that case, you need to drive the car for [15 to 20 minutes above 50 mph \(80.47 km/h\)](#).

It will reset your Wrangler's tire pressure light right away.

Method 3. Use The TPMS Reset Tool

If driving your car doesn't reset the tire pressure light, you should use a 3rd-party TPMS Reset Tool. Because the Jeep Wrangler doesn't have any TPMS Reset button.

In my case, the [OBDLink MX+](#) gave better performance than other alternatives. However, you also need the [TTXSPP Cable Adaptor for Chrysler](#) to connect the device to your car.

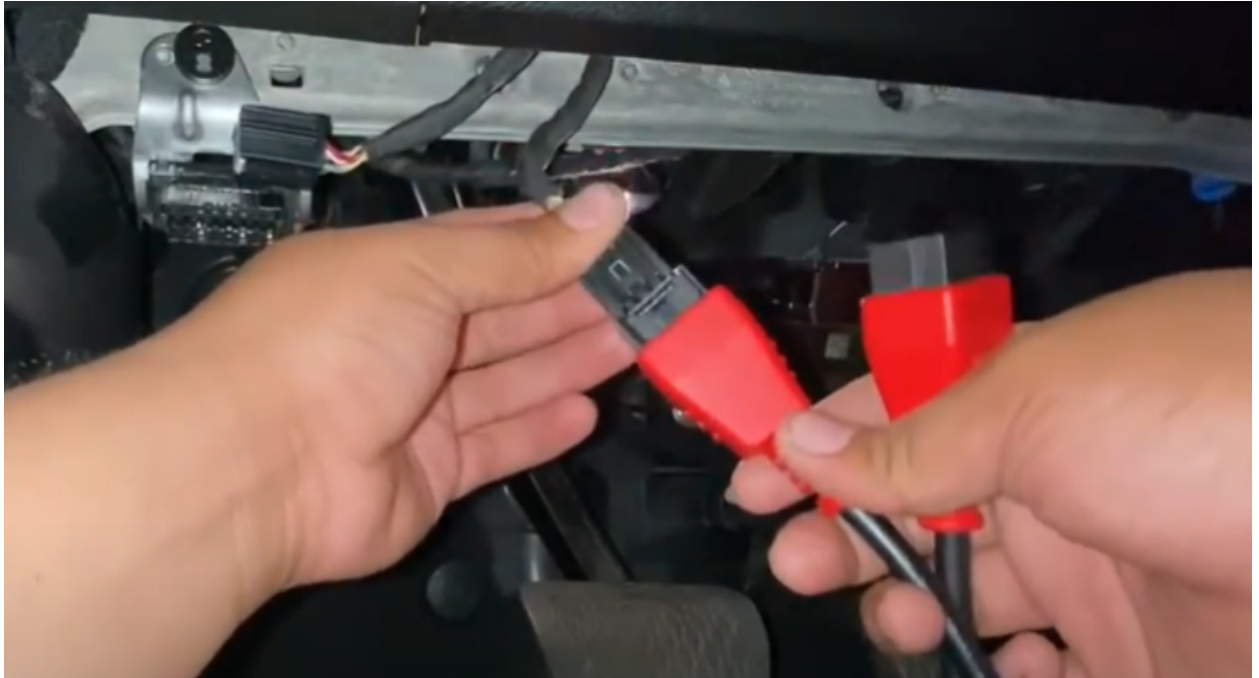
Read the following steps to use the device:

- Connect the cable adaptor to the OBDLink MX+ device
- Go underneath the steering wheel and detach the two cable connectors.

- Connect the tow port of the TTXSPP Cable Adaptor for Chrysler with your car's cable.



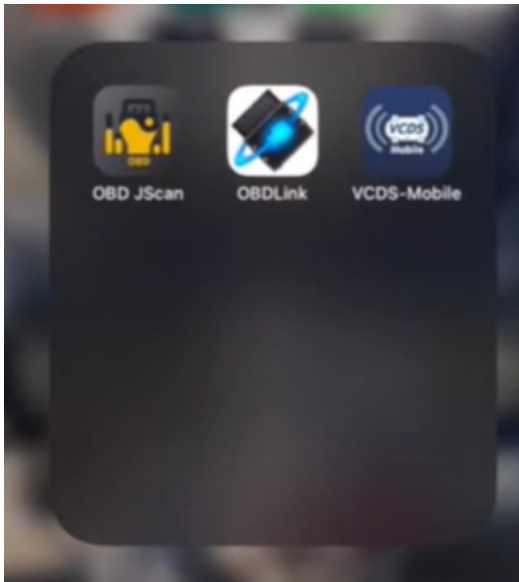

- Check for the power light in your OBDLink MX+ device.



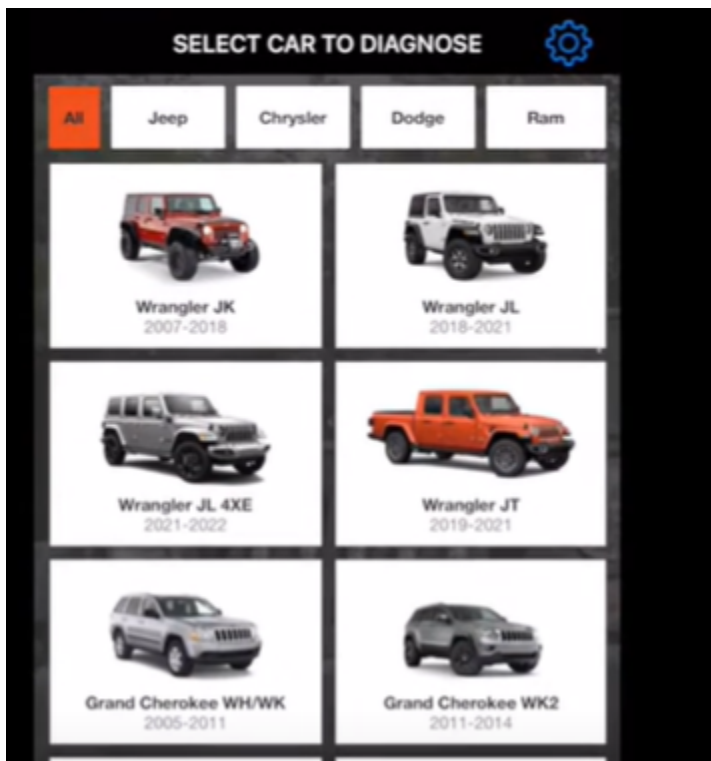

- Open your phone and open the OBDLink app.

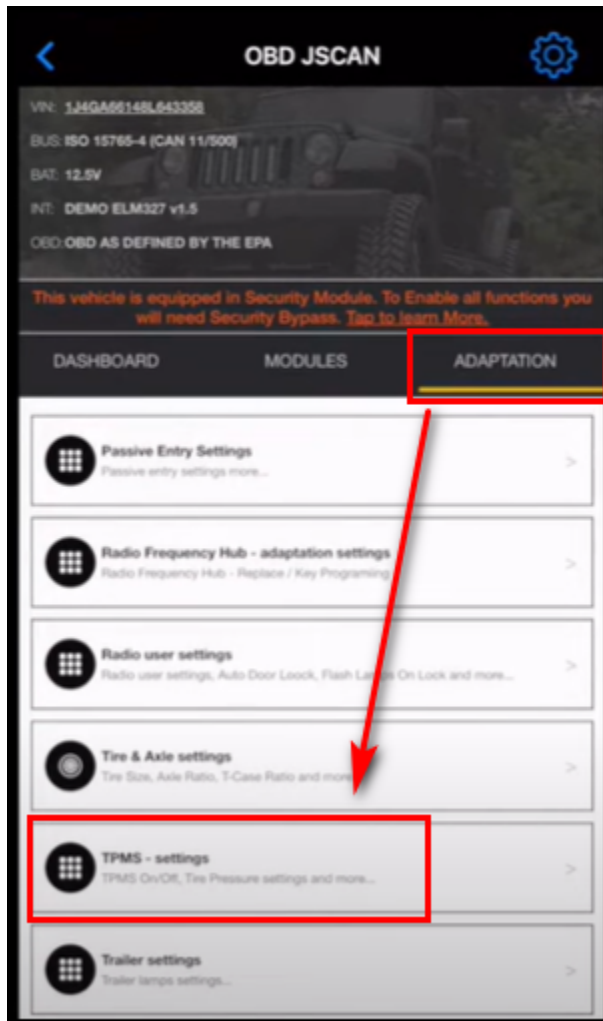
- Select your car from the app interface.

- Choose your OBD adapter from the list and go to Adaptation.

- Select the TPMS settings.

- Lower the tire pressure or deactivate it as you see fit.
- Disconnect the car cables and put them back in your car.

And after completing the steps, the tire pressure light will reset and won't bother you again.

Last Solution: Replace TPMS Sensor

If any of the 3 methods don't fix your issue, your car's TPMS Sensor is severely damaged. So you need to replace that to reset your tire pressure light.

FAQs

As a Jeep Wrangler owner wanting to reset the tire pressure light, you should know some frequently asked questions. It will give you some insights into the functions of tire pressure lights in Jeep Wrangler.

Where Is The TPMS Reset Button In A Jeep Wrangler?

Unfortunately, there isn't any TPMS Reset button in the Jeep Wrangler. You need to use any 3rd party tool to reset it.

Why Is My Tire Pressure Light Still On After Filling The Tires?

The Tire Pressure Lights are still on because the TPMS didn't properly transmit the data to your car's computer. Just drive the car for 20 minutes, and it will turn off.

How Much Do I Have To Pay To Relearn TPMS?

Usually, TPMS relearn price depends on factors like the making year or model of your Jeep Wrangler. But it won't exceed \$100.

How Much Tire Pressure Does A Usual Jeep Wrangler Need?

Jeep Wrangler typically needs 35 to 38 PSI depending on the model.

Conclusion

In short, there isn't any TPMS Reset Button in the Jeep Wrangler. So to reset the tire pressure light, you first need to up your tire's air 3 to 4 PSI, then down it to normal. After that, drive the car for half an hour.

If the issue still persists, use any 3rd party TPMS Reset Tool to reset your Wrangler's tire pressure light.
