We will learn that sacraments are sacred rituals, instituted by Jesus and entrusted to the Church. Through the sacraments God's grace is instilled by the Holy Spirit. We will delve deeper into the seven sacraments: Baptism, Reconciliation, Eucharist, Confirmation, Matrimony, Holy Orders, and Anointing of the Sick. Standard 3: SACRAMENTS: Understand and participate in the sacraments of the Church as efficacious signs of God's grace, instituted by Christ and entrusted to the Church.

- 7.03.01 Investigate the fruits of the Sacrament of Baptism to include forgiveness of all sins, birth into a new life, and a share in Christ's three-fold mission as priest, prophet, and king.
- 7.03.02 Explain the Church's teachings on those who die without Baptism.
- 7.03.03 Discuss special circumstances concerning Baptism of necessity.
- 7.03.04 Understand that the Sacraments of Penance (Reconciliation) and Eucharist increase our spiritual strength and grace.
- 7.03.05 Describe the Sacrament of Confirmation and the elements of laying on of hands and sealing with oil of chrism.
- 7.03.06 Describe the conditions that make marriage a sacrament: baptized man and woman, free consent, the intention to marry for the good of spouses, and open to children.
- 7.03.08 Recognize spouses as ministers of the Sacrament of Matrimony through expression of marriage vows.
- 7.03.09 Relate that the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick confers special grace on the Christian experiencing illness or old age.
- 7.03.10 Differentiate between the common priesthood of the faithful and the ministerial priesthood.
- 7.03.11 Describe how Christians participate in the priesthood of Christ especially through sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Holy Orders.
- 7.03.12 Identify ministerial priesthood as an apostolic call that comes from Jesus Christ.
- 7.03.13 Describe the validity of the Sacrament of Holy Orders for men who are baptized, prepared through seminary education, and called by the bishop to be ordained.
- 7.03.14 Identify and describe the three ranks of the priesthood: episcopate, presbyterate, and diaconate.



- 7.08.01 Describe how the different liturgical traditions or Rites of the Church are unified by one profession of faith, the celebration of the seven sacraments and one hierarchy.
- 7.08.02 Recall the belief that the Church has the power to forgive sins through the Sacraments.
- 7.08.03 State that a Catholic may fully participate in the liturgies of all the Rites of the Catholic Church.
- 7.08.07 Explain that the Church is the People of God, incorporating facets of many models or ways of understanding the Church: Institution, Mystical Communion, Sacrament, Herald, Servant, and Community of Disciples.
