CSUSB named to inaugural college service program

Cal State San Bernardino was one of 45 colleges and universities chosen to be part of the #CaliforniansForAll College Corps, a historic program where students will have the opportunity to serve their communities and help pay for their college.

Under the two-year fellowship program set to begin in the fall, CSUSB will recruit, train, place, supervise and evaluate each year 75 full-time undergraduate students, including 25 eligible Dreamer students, at both the San Bernardino and Palm Desert campuses.

At CSUSB, the program plans to coach 3,500 K-12 students, and for the tutoring aspect, 5,000 students will be tutored to help them increase and/or improve their academic performance.

Earth – Keeping Humans in Orbit

NASA has partnered with SpaceX and Boeing to provide transportation to the International Space Station for our astronauts. In addition, private organizations are beginning to send non-astronauts into space as well. We will discuss the latest news on the Commercial Crew Program, as well as the new access our partnerships and non-governmental space organizations are providing to space and all of its wonder.

Moon — Hazards of Deep Space to Astronauts

Jan. 25 at 5 p.m. EST

As NASA astronauts move farther away from Earth, they have to consider new set of hazards. The NASA STEM Engagement team has created an educator guide to help bring your students along on the journey. We will walk through the "<u>Hazards to Deep Space Astronauts</u>" educator guide and focus on some of the included activities to dig into how to use these to reach students about the Artemis Generation.

Explore Humans in Space – Christa McAuliffe's Lost Lessons in Space: Chromatography Event Date: Jan. 25 at 7 p.m. EST

Join us for the third of four webinars to honor the memory of Christa McAuliffe, the first teacher to be chosen to travel to space. Due to the tragic space shuttle Challenger disaster in 1986, McAuliffe did not film the science lessons in space as planned. Astronauts Joe Acaba and Ricky Arnold, both former educators, spent the 2017-18 school year aboard the International

Space Station for A Year of Education on Station. As a tribute to McAuliffe and her legacy, Acaba and Arnold completed Christa's lost lessons. The demonstrations were filmed aboard the station, and corresponding lessons were developed for classrooms. Participants will learn about hands-on, standards-aligned activities about chromatography and capillary action. Explore how capillary action occurs in microgravity aboard the station. Investigate how black ink divides into different colors through chromatography. Compare and contrast capillary action as seen on the station and in your classroom on Earth. Also, learn about leaf chromatography and walking rainbows. Leave with a classroom-ready presentation that works great for in-person, at home or virtual presentations.

Explore Humans in Space - Celebrating Sally Ride

Event Date: Jan. 26 at 7 p.m. EST

EarthKAM is a digital camera mounted in a window aboard the International Space Station that takes pictures of Earth. This NASA educational outreach program gives students, teachers and the public the opportunity to learn about Earth from the unique perspective of space. During Sally Ride EarthKAM missions (periods when the Sally Ride EarthKAM camera is operational), students worldwide request images of specific locations on Earth. The entire collection of <u>Sally Ride EarthKAM images</u> is available in a searchable image archive. This archive and accompanying activities are extraordinary resources to engage students in Earth and space science, geography, social studies, mathematics, communications and art.

Humans in Space – The Effects of Microgravity

Event Date: Jan. 27 at 5 p.m. EST

As NASA missions venture farther out into our solar system, astronauts will be spending more and more time in low or microgravity environments. NASA must learn how to protect astronauts from bone loss and muscle atrophy, so they are able to explore when they arrive at their celestial destinations. Learn about functional fitness and share activities that can be done with students to brainstorm ways to mitigate those problems as part of the Artemis Generation of explorers.

Explore Humans in Space – Bones, Muscles and Astro-Mice

Event Date: Jan. 27 at 7 p.m. EST

For over 20 years, astronauts from around the world have lived and worked aboard the International Space Station. This unique orbiting laboratory is central to solving the many challenges of long-duration spaceflight, and animals play a key role in understanding how organisms respond to microgravity. Explore how the study of astro-mice is helping to protect the bones and muscles of future Artemis astronauts. Implications for Earth-based medicine and relevant instructional resources will also be included.

Explore Solar System and Beyond – Solar System Scroll and the Scale of Discovery Event Date: Jan. 31 at 6 p.m. EST

Participants will learn about hands-on, standards-aligned activities using scale to create a scroll of the universe. Explore the inner planets, outer planets, and asteroids with various-sized fruit while learning about the Dawn and New Horizons missions. Learn how to create a solar system pocket scroll based on the ratios of our solar system. Explore applications of fractions, conversions, and scale with hands-on, standards-aligned NASA STEM activities. Engage our universe as you apply scale to distance, time, size, and models. Apply fractions related to our

solar system within the home, classroom, and beyond. Attendees will receive a slideshow presentation ready to use in the classroom, at home, or online.

45 colleges selected as part of first round of 'Californians for All' College Corps

Gov. Gavin Newsom announced Tuesday that 45 colleges and universities would receive the first round of funding in the new **Californians For All College Corps**. The corps, which is similar to AmeriCorps, will deploy up to 6,500 students from the 45 colleges to work or intern in organizations that are working to improve K-12 education, climate action and food insecurity in California. Students can earn a \$10,000 stipend for participating after a year of service.
