States the Lawrences are sculptors and oil painters who are interchangeably and simultaneously work on every piece together to create highly ornamental and imposing pieces of art. Their work explores new expressions of biophilic design, cryptography, esotericism, and allegory through the use of paint.

And unusual innovative mediums, brick and chase, welcome to the casual temple.

Thank you. Well, just going to kind of jump in and ask the first question because I've seen videos on Instagram of you two kind of working on your different pieces. And so I'm wondering how you divide the labor of each piece between the two of you?

How that works?

00:01:40 Brooke

So sometimes we'll work on the same piece at the same time, but.

Most of the time it depends on how big it is, and lately we've been working.

On huge pieces.

Constantly for the past year so.

00:01:52 Brooke

They do not weigh more.

00:01:54 Brooke

But there's some days where chase is like working on sculptures outside. And I'm like in the studio working on paintings or vice versa. And sometimes that changes just during the day we're.

Super fluid about it.

00:02:06 Chase

Yeah, a lot of times. I mean our work now, like for the current series we're doing for this exhibition, everything's really big so.

We're more or less like working on everything at the same time.

But we definitely will like kind of bounce around like she's on this painting. I'll be on the sculpture and then kind of switcheroo. But a lot of.

Times we will.

Be working at the same exact time.

00:02:31 Chase

You know, it's a lot of area to cover and.

A lot of the things we're we're doing, like the processes are.

Kind of like two man jobs. If you want to be efficient about it, so you know, like we're using a lot of like, dry. Well, I won't say dry but like.

Mineral earth pigments. So just, you know, any kind of natural pigment that's made from.

Titanium dioxide, chromium oxide.

Iron oxide, which is basically just rust, all that kind of good stuff, so we'll need to cover like a six foot statue and like this type of.

Medium. So it's a lot easier if you know we're both kind of going around at the same time, but.

Missed it? That was something that I was speaking about.

Well, it's less about marketing. I would, I would say just more about like how do we want.

Materials taken directly from nature and some of them are preserved and then a lot of them are still living and the great thing about like a lot of mosses and lichens, is they don't, they don't really ever die. They just kind of go dormant.

Spores that are like resting there. So like you're saying, if you miss them and they get just enough UV.

They will.

Begin growing again so you could do that at this stage. Like if you if you just bought one right now you couldn't missed it and keep it.

But we also have methods we've tested out for preservation, so we're kind of leaning more on.

Preserving the botanicals so that.

They are not high maintenance, but there is a really awesome kind of conceptual factor with leaving some of them alive, depending on what the sculptures about, I'm sure we'll get into this, but we work a lot like this whole body works all about alchemy. So.

There are some pieces where it makes sense to let the vibrant green living.

Botanicals kind of.

Fade and wither because when they do they turn white and they're bleached.

Which when we get into that, it's kind of like your albedo.

Stage type of stuff. So there is something about that I really like and I think.

We're going to leave some where it is they are living.

Or dormant or whatever they've kind of withered into like a bleached white. No, there's no chlorophyll going on. Everything's kinda.

You know, it's just taking its natural course and it and it is what it is. So it's pretty interesting because they'll go from, like, green and blue and then they'll.
