The Meaning of Advent

Advent comes from the Latin word *adventus*, which means "coming." Each year during this season, we prepare for the arrival of Christ in our hearts and homes, in our lives, and in our church; both now and in some future day which will surprise us!

Advent marks the beginning of the church's liturgical year and it lasts the four weeks before Christmas.

In December we see shortened days, longer nights, and the quieting of the earth for winter. The shift in seasons compels us inward – into our homes that we brighten in response with candles, evergreens, and song, and into our inner selves, which we adorn with silence, prayer, meditation, and the reading of scripture.

When we do these things in Advent, we become better ready to receive, at Christmas, the brightness of yet another birthday of Christ, in and around us.

We hope this Advent booklet provides some ideas for observing the Advent season in your own home in a way that is quiet and creative, and filled with wonder and expectation.

The Advent Wreath

Use your Advent Wreath during meals or during your prayers at night, to remind you to get your heart ready for Jesus' coming. Light one candle for each week of Advent.

- The round shape, which has no beginning and no end, reminds us of God, who had no beginning and will have no end. God always was and always will be.
- 2. The green leaves remind us of life, and especially the new life we have when Jesus is in our hearts.
- 3. The red berries remind us of Jesus' blood, which he shed when he died on the cross.
- 4. The four candles remind us of the four Sundays of Advent.

- 5. Purple is a color for royalty, and the purple candles remind us that Jesus came to be our King. The pink candle (lighted on the third week of Advent) is the "Rejoice!" candle the birth of the Christ child is near!
- 6. The light of the candles reminds us that Jesus came to be the Light of the World.

Advent Devotions

Reader: Christ, be our light.

Shine in our hearts.

Shine through the darkness.

All: Christ, be our light!

The candle(s) is (are) lit.

Reader: Thank you, God, for this candle flame. Lead us through

the waiting of Advent towards the hope which comes

from you alone.

All: Amen.

Jesus, you came to be light in our darkness.


Jesus, you came to be peace in our conflicts.

and to bring your love in our fears.






