Page 40: Name some of the people leading the civil rights movement in the United States?	<i>Some of the people leading the civil rights movement were. Martin Luther King, Rosa Park and Malcolm X.</i>
Page 41: When did the dawn raids begin?	<i>The dawn raids began in March 1974 under a labour government that was led by Norman Kirk.</i>

Anything that would prove their right to be in NZ.</i>

It separated families, Second being. Many families might have gotten the wrong idea of the person being deported. The kids might have thought their parents were some type of criminal because of how the police treated them.</i>
Page 42: Find a range of evidence to show that Pacific people were 'targeted' during this time.	<i>Evidence that Pasifika people were targeted is that. Robert Muldoon himself was open about going to deport Islanders. More evidence is that Islanders experienced blitzes. Blitzes were random checks, in public, when police demanded proof of residency.</i>

Page 45: What role did Frank Gill have in the New Zealand government?	<i>Frank Gill was the Minister of Immigration. The minister of immigration is in charge of leading the policy and strategic direction of the NZ immigration system and setting the rules and criteria for the granting of visas and entry permission.</i>
