NC Teacher Information for Student Voting Activity

- The ballot is easy to implement in your classroom, for a grade-level or schoolwide vote, or homework.
- The Election 2024 student vote is open October 21–November 5, 2024.
- Student results will be available after the election ends. It is fun and instructional to compare how students voted vs the official vote.
- A wide variety of teaching resources are provided – use what you want.

Ballot information

Ballot options enable you to choose how your students participate. Read the important notes below before moving forward with your activity plans.

- President, NC Governor, and NC Superintendent
- President only

Important notes:

- All educators are encouraged to focus student learning on content: the government office(s) on the ballot, exploration of civic literacy themes and knowledge, and engaging students in informed civic action through elections and voting.
- All materials are non-partisan and nonpolitical and are tied to social studies and ELA standards and related educational goals.

Setting up the voting activity

Technology

- The ballot is designed for use on ipad, mobile phone, Chromebook, laptop, etc. Web access is required.
- Use the loop ballot if you are setting up a voting station used by multiple students.
- Depending on your device configuration, you may need to enter the URL each voting day and clear the cache and browser history.
- Use the 1:1 ballot if you are sharing the link or QR code with each student (for example on the screen in the classroom, for homework, etc.)

Timing

- This is up to you! The ballots are open October 21–November 5.
- Use the activity on a designated voting day, over a period of days you choose, or whatever works best for your school or classroom.
- If you are using shared devices, holding a vote in the media center, or need extra time, incorporate that into your plan.
- Include time for students to learn about the candidates and voting process. Use the provided lessons and information for this purpose.
- The ballot is very short and takes little time to complete.

Additional ballot information

School Name

- At the beginning of the ballot, students will select your school's name.
- This information is needed for school-level results. [You may request a school level ballot to bypass this step](#), or you can skip it if desired.

Spanish language ballot option

- Click the bar at the top of the ballot page and select Spanish.

Candidate order and party on the student ballot

- Candidates are listed in alphabetical order. The party is not listed.

Other races on the adult ballot

- The adult ballot you will vote on and student ballot in this activity are different.
- This activity is designed to be educational for your students and easy to implement in the time you have available.

- Having a student ballot exactly mimic the adult ballot would make this activity difficult for you and your students.

Decorating the classroom or school for elections

- You may decorate however you wish and is permitted by your school leadership and district policy.
- If you choose to make a bulletin board or display for the election, ensure that all information is nonpartisan, fair, accurate, and equal. For example, candidate images should be the same for opposing parties (for example, don't have one large photo of a smiling candidate and one tiny one with a bad image of the other candidate). If you display one candidate's image, information, or name, you must do the same for all candidates in that race.
- If your school is an Election Day polling place, you have the opportunity to introduce your school to neighbors who don't have students at the school. While you may not display anything political or partisan – if in doubt, leave it out – students might make voting (“vote here” not “vote for”) posters or flags to decorate doors and hallways voters might use, or write letters to thank the elections officials working there. (Be sure to get any activity approved by school leadership!)

Educational resources

This activity and the accompanying resources have been developed and informed over time by educators like you. Because different schools and classrooms have different needs, you may use what works best for your students. Feel free to modify lessons and activities as needed.

Toolkit contains lessons, resources, discussion, reading and writing activities, critical thinking, informational literacy, decision-making, government, civic participation, ways to align Election 2024 to curriculum standards, and more.
