

First Lesson

Exodus 12:1-14

Reader

A reading from the twelfth chapter of Exodus.

The LORD said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. Your lamb shall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight. They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. Do not eat any of it raw or boiled in water, but roasted over the fire, with its head, legs, and inner organs. You shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn. This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the LORD. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the LORD. The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt. This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the LORD; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

Psalm 116.1, 10-17 at the Gradual

Reader A reading from the eleventh chapter of Paul's first letter to the Corinthians.

I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

The Gospel

John 13:1-17, 31b-35

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean." After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord—and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.

"Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jewish authorities so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot come.' I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

Peace is my last gift to you, my own peace I now leave with you; peace which the world cannot give, I give to you.





Communion of the People

All are welcome to receive Holy Communion. As the Iona Community says, "Come to this table, you who have much faith and you who would like to have more; you who have been here often and you who have not been here in a long time; you who have tried to follow Jesus and you who have failed. Come. It is Christ who invites us to meet him here."

Ushers will assist you to approach by the center and return by the side aisles. You are welcome to receive the bread and/or the wine when presented; we believe that the divine presence is fully present in both the bread and the wine, and you may refuse either. For example, you may choose to receive only the bread, and then walk away; or, if you would like, you may touch the chalice with your hand, and not actually consume any wine. If you would like to receive the blessing of the Church, but not communion, indicate to the clergy by crossing your arms when approached. If you are not able to come forward, please motion to an usher, and communion will be brought to you.



The Stripping and Washing of the Altar

The choir sings Psalm 22

My God, my God, why have you forsaken me, and are so far from my cry and from the words of my distress?

O my God, I cry in the daytime, but you do not answer; by night as well, but I find no rest.

Yet you are the Holy One, enthroned upon the praises of Israel.

Our forebears put their trust in you; they trusted, and you delivered them.

They cried out to you and were delivered; they trusted in you and were not put to shame.

But as for me, I am a worm, and less than human, scorned by all and despised by the people.

All who see me laugh me to scorn; they curl their lips and wag their heads, saying,

"You trusted in God for deliverance; let God rescue you, if God delights in you."

Yet you, O God, are the one who took me out of the womb and kept me safe upon my mother's breast.

I have been entrusted to you ever since I was born; you were my God when I was still in my mother's womb.

Be not far from me, for trouble is near, and there is none to help.

Many young bulls encircle me; strong bulls of Bashan surround me.

They open wide their jaws at me, like a ravening and a roaring lion.

I am poured out like water; all my bones are out of joint; my heart within my breast is melting wax.

My mouth is dried out like a pot-sherd; my tongue sticks to the roof of my mouth,

and you have laid me in the dust of the grave.

Packs of dogs close me in, and gangs of evildoers circle around me;

they pierce my hands and my feet; I can count all my bones.

They stare and gloat over me; they divide my garments among them; they cast lots for my clothing.

Be not far away, O God; you are my strength; hasten to help me.

Save me from the sword, my life from the power of the dog.

Save me from the lion's mouth, my wretched body from the horns of wild bulls.

I will declare your Name to my people; in the midst of the congregation I will praise you.

May all who fear you, O God, give praise; may the offspring of Israel stand in awe, and all of Jacob's line give glory.

For you do not despise nor abhor the poor in their poverty, neither do you hide your face from them,

but when they cry to you, you hear them.

My praise is of you in the great assembly; I will perform my vows in the presence of those who worship you.

The poor shall eat and be satisfied, and those who seek you shall praise you: "May your heart live for ever!"

All the ends of the earth shall remember and turn to you, and all the families of the nations shall bow before you.

For yours is the royal power, O God; you rule over the nations.

To you alone all who sleep in the earth bow down in worship; all who go down to the dust fall before you.

My soul shall live for you; my descendants shall serve you; they shall be known as yours for ever.

They shall come and make known to a people yet unborn the saving deeds that you have done.

A MUSICAL CELEBRATION of WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH

Notes on women contributors featured in today's liturgy

Prelude: Jeanne Demessieux (France, 1921-1968) was declared in 1944 "the greatest organist of all generations" by her teacher Marcel Dupré, at the time perhaps the most famous organist in the world. She was the first female organist to sign a record deal. As David Allen wrote in the New York Times in a centenary tribute, "Demessieux seemed destined to take a top liturgical position, at Dupré's St.-Sulpice or even at Notre-Dame. But shortly after her debut, Dupré, who appears to have been fed unfounded rumors that Demessieux had been disloyal, cut off contact with his pupil and resolved to sabotage her career", and she remained at her parish church until 1962, when she became "titulaire" (chief organist) at the Madeleine in Paris. She died prematurely from cancer at 47. Her reputation suffered from changing tastes in interpretation of Baroque repertoire, and from obscurity resulting from the difficulty of many of her own compositions, which limited the frequency of their performances. She has recovered some in recent years with the rerelease of her own recordings, and new performances by contemporary organists. Presentation Hymn: Annabel Morris Buchanan (1888-1983) "was an American composer and folklorist. The author of the book Folk Hymns of America (1938) as well as myriad journal articles, Buchanan (along with John Powell) helped found the White Top Folk Festival (hosted in Grayson County, Virginia, from 1931 to 1939), which promoted music of the people in the Appalachian Mountains. Buchanan's documenting practices are credited for preserving many folk songs that might have otherwise gone on unrecorded."

All Night Vigil This Evening: Following the conclusion of this evening's service, we invite you to join participants holding an all night silent vigil lasting until Friday morning at 8:00 AM in the Cathedral Nave.

The Way of the Cross (Stations of the Cross): On Good Friday, at 1:00PM, following the Proper Liturgy for Good Friday at which he will preach, The Rev'd Christopher Worthley invites you to join him in walking and praying the Way of the Cross, following the 14 Stations that hang year-round in the nave of the Cathedral. The Way of the Cross is a contemplative devotion in remembrance of Christ's passion, a series of events at the end of Jesus' life from his condemnation to his burial. The devotion imitates the practice of visiting the places of Jesus' passion in the Holy Land by early pilgrims. The first stations outside the Holy Land were built in Bologna, Italy, in the 5th century. This particular devotion, traditionally conducted on Fridays in Lent, was encouraged by followers of St. Francis and became common in the 15th century. The version we will use for this simple, spoken liturgy that moves throughout the nave is taken from *The Book of Occasional Services* of the Episcopal Church. This is a unique opportunity to dwell intentionally in the in-between experience that is Good Friday, a time to be with, and walk quietly with, our Savior. Please join us!

Our Annual Easter Egg Hunt will be held between the Easter services at 10:30 am in the Bishop's Garden, inside the gate adjacent to the State Street entrance to the cathedral; in case of rain, in Emmanuel Chapel, at the back of the nave. Everyone is welcome to this fun-filled celebration!
