Findings

The subject seemed to be extremely happy to get out and get some fresh air. They exclaimed about their plans for the weekend with the other inmates. The positivity was cited as having great luck in terms of their emotional state going into the experiment. However, this wouldn't match up with the answers I gained from the questions.

Luck-Based Experimental Questionnaire:

1.) Have you ever gone to a casino, traded stocks or invested in cryptocurrency? If you have gone on any of these ventures, how would you describe your results? Did you manage to make a return on any of these trades?

A: I have actually done all three to keep it real with you, and honestly? I am down on all of them. Every single investment is a fucking failure.

2.) What kind of career path did you take growing up? Did you manage to find yourself in a position for a lot of upward growth and promotion or were you mostly left on the bottom rung?

A: It's all positive, very positive. I got a lot of promotions when I was growing up. My mom always loved how I went up the ladder.

3.) Have you had any issues in your love life or break ups within the family? Describe your relationship with your closest family member or your farthest, depending on what affected you more.

A: Everything was all good on my end. I'm just too high to really go in depth, but I really loved my mom, you know?

Results of the Dice Rolls:

1.) 61

2.) 73

3.) 71

Average: 68.3

When the subject finished with their questions and rolls, they put their hand into SCP-1162. They pulled out a Level 3 Clearance card, something that goes even above what I can utilize right now. Despite having average luck in their questions and slightly above average luck in their rolls, they gained something that could have easily gotten them around most of the facility. However, they could not escape from the facility with it. Therefore, I consider Level 3 Clearance to be above-average.

This correlates with the rolls and the answers, despite the financial issues cited.

Conclusion

While I don't think I can definitively conclude anything from this single test, I can say that I am beginning to see the correlation I hypothesized originally. Whether it will lead to anything further is yet to be seen, but the subject's luck was above-average. They could have accessed many different SCPs with that card had they been left to their own devices.

I will need to conduct more tests to see if the correlation holds true, but the beginning of the trend has set the bar. Will it be raised with the next subject, or will my initial findings crumble under the weight of luck's expectations? Science will find the answer.

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The Test

The second test of this series is to understand what determines the item that is received from SCP-1162 is based off of. For years, we have struggled to understand exactly what it is that makes SCP-1162 conjure the items that it does. Pulling from the past or equipping our subjects with weapons at random, it strikes me. Is it consistently tied to some criteria we are unaware of?

Similar to gambling, I have chosen to put my bets on luck. However, the quantification of luck is something that most scientists have never chosen to dive into. After all, how can one put a number to such a fickle, nearly non-existent concept? Simple.

The subject will be provided a one-hundred sided die. While performing a specific luck-based evaluation, they will be made to roll this dice three times. After every roll, they will be asked a question about their luck in life. This will target three aspects: luck in gambling, luck in their career path and luck in their relationships, both family and friends.

Once we have gone through this initial questioning, we will have the subject pick an item from SCP-1162's depths. After the item is extracted, it will be recorded and the subject will be returned to D-Block without issues.

Aim

The aim of this test is to gain a deeper understanding behind SCP-1162's choice in item issuance. While there are many stimuli that have likely been explored by my fellow researchers, I desire to break new ground with a thorough experimentation process into the correlation I believe may lie beneath the surface.

The correlation of luck and value. Does it truly exist? Can SCP-1162's items actually be predicted based on the average of the rolls and the deciphering of the subject's answers to my questions? I hope to see a trend or to be able to put this to bed once and for all.

Hypothesis

I hypothesize that we will see a direct correlation between the luck that the subject has and the item that is gained. For example, if a subject is destined to roll high and shows exemplary luck based on their answers, firearms should appear. Should their luck be middling, I expect to see cuffs or blunt weapons. Finally, if their luck should be abysmal, I expect cheap items or miscellaneous items that will be irrelevant to their situation.

The idea is to put yourself in the shoes of the D-Class. What would the luckiest thing be for them to receive in that moment? The item's usefulness, the ability to utilize it in the present situation, is what I hope to quantify and correlate with the results of their luck-based examinations.

Based on my previous results, this trend had begun. I wonder if it will continue.

Findings

Average: 65

Once the subject reached their hand into SCP-1163, they pulled out a semi-automatic firearm. This item was quickly confiscated by the Officer escorting us, but the result was shocking to say the least. The subject seemed slightly frustrated that the gun was taken away from them so quickly. It is clear that stellar luck could have been demonstrated had it not been for our guard.

Conclusion

While the first test of this series offered a basis to work with, this study flies in the face of the groundwork that the first built. Average luck overall with the questions answered, slightly above average luck with the rolls, yet absolutely stellar luck with the item that they received from SCP-1165. If I am to believe in my hypothesis, this was the not the result that should have been.

I am a man of science who wishes to believe luck can be quantified. Perhaps it could even be controlled. However, this study is doing more to prove that luck is a very random integer. The first test proves correlation, the second disproves. I will run one final test to see where the majority will lie with this SCP for the moment.

Average: 42

The item that was finally obtained from the SCP was a small sidearm. I think this is above-average in terms of luck due to it being very useful in getting out of tight situations. However, I have doubts a simple sidearm would be enough to escape the facility. This has proven the lack of correlation to me.
