<b>revolution</b>	a revolt of one society against another in the hopes of gaining rights, freedom, or power
<b>reverse</b>	to go backwards
<b>revoke</b>	to take away
<b>revise</b>	to change, fix, or improve
<b>reveal</b>	to show, open up, to expose
<b>revisit</b>	to go back and to look at again or to go again
<b>revolt</b>	to rise up or rebel or (verb or noun), something that is disgusting (adj)
<b>revert</b>	to change back to its original state
<b>revenue</b>	money that is earned

## Revisiting Current Events: Hurricane Harvey

<b>mayhem</b>	violent or damaging disorder; chaos.: "complete mayhem broke out"
<b>propel</b>	drive, push, or cause to move in a particular direction, typically forward.: "the boat is propelled by using a very long paddle" "a rocket-propelled grenade launcher"
<b>floodplains</b>	an area of low-lying ground adjacent to a river, formed mainly of river sediments and subject to flooding.
<b>agglomeration</b>	a mass or collection of things; an assemblage.: "the arts center is an agglomeration of theaters, galleries, shops, restaurants,
<b>quintessentially</b>	used to emphasize the most perfect or typical example of a quality or class.: "a quintessentially English pop song
<b>Manifest Destiny</b>	the 19th-century doctrine or belief that the expansion of the US throughout the American continents was both justified and inevitable.
<b>postwar</b>	occurring or existing after a war (especially World War II).:
<b>antidote</b>	a medicine taken or given to counteract a particular poison
<b>calamity</b>	an event causing great and often sudden damage or distress; a disaster.: "the fire was the latest calamity to strike the area""the journey had led to calamity and ruin".
<b>wrenching</b>	pull or twist (someone or something) suddenly and violently.: "Casey grabbed the gun and wrenched it upward from my hand" "she wrenched herself free of his grip" "the betrayal wrenched at her heart".
