In loving Memory of Beowulf

You're all invited to pay tribute, honor the memory, criticize or condemn the "heroism" of Beowulf. You can decide to be anyone or anything in Beowulf's life that would have an interest in his death, for good or bad. Examples include but are not limited to: Grendel, Grendel's mom, Hrothgar, Beowulf's family, citizens of Geatland or Daneland, Grendel's arm, Herot, etc. Make your eulogy speech roughly **one page** long. It will be important in your eulogy both to define "heroism," give examples of what makes one a hero, and justify your opinions with textual references (**2** minimum). Make sure you choose a specific **tone** (sad, angry, etc.) and stick with it. Develop your own specific **voice** as you write (this is not an essay, you're a real person with real thoughts). **Title it as Eulogy from _____'s perspective.** Hyperlink it in a comment on your evaluation document.

Part 2 of Beowulf Assignment:

On a separate sheet of paper (but same Google document/same linked comment) I would like you to compile a bulleted list of ten important facts you learned about the Anglo-saxon time period. These ten bullet points must be with **complete sentences** and complete thoughts. Five of these facts must come from your own research and preparation for the fair. Five (5) of these facts must come from what you learned at the fair itself. This forces you to pay close attention, listen and learn from others.

Make sure you **MLA format** this document with a **header, in-text citations, and a separate Works Cited page**.

Due: The day **after** the fair, **Thursday, Jan. 31st**.
