Los Angeles Unified Board of Education Honors Filipino Heritage Month

Los Angeles (October 17, 2023) - Today, the Los Angeles Unified Board of Education approved a resolution sponsored by Board Vice President Scott M. Schmerelson and co-sponsored by all members of the board, dedicating October 2023 as Filipino Heritage Month.

The resolution celebrates the importance of Filipino Heritage in Los Angeles and within the Los Angeles Unified School District, reminding all students, staff, and families to learn more about the rich history of Historic Filipinotown, influential community leaders such as Larry Itliong, and cultural symbols such as food, music, and art. Additionally, it requests Superintendent Carvalho to look into establishing a dual-language program in the Filipino language.
