The organizing committee reserves the right not to accept papers that do not meet the requirements.

The paper requirements:

Length: 1000–1300 words, 4–5 pages, A4 format, Microsoft Word document (*.doc, docs, docx)

Font: Times New Roman, size: 14, line spacing: 1.5, paragraph indent: 0.4" (1 cm), margins: 20 mm

Order of presentation in the paper:

- Conference panel
- Author's full name (bold font)
- Name of the educational institution/research institute, city, country
- For researchers: academic title, degree, position, email
- For Ph.D. students, postgraduate and undergraduate students: status, the year of study, faculty, educational program, email, academic advisor (full name, academic title, degree, position)
- Report title (uppercase letters)
- Text of the report (in English)
- Sources and literature (in the original languages)

Pages should not be numbered.

Sources and literature (without repetitions) are formatted at the end of the text in the order of reference.

In the text, references are indicated in brackets, including the number of the source and a page, for example: [1, p. 89].

The file name should correspond to the last and first names of the conference participant (for example, Marchenko_Olena_paper).
