How is this book particularly appropriate for the students in this course?

Never Fall Down is appropriate for a student taking a World Literature in that it exposes them to one of the world's lesser-known genocides. Many students are only aware of the Hitler's genocide and this book opens their eyes to the fact that this sort of atrocity has happened across the history of the world. The book is written as Arn speaks, so the students have to get used to the region-specific dialect McCormick uses as a way to authenticate this fictionalization of Arn's story. This text serves to expand students' thinking about their world and fosters a global mindset. Students who are working toward their Global Education Certificate will be exposed to a wealth of subjects to explore in their portfolio work.

How is this book especially pertinent to the objectives of this course and/or unit of study?

Students use this text as a vehicle to study other global genocides and examine the leaders, politics, and cultural ramifications of these tragic periods in history. Students also look into topics like child soldiers, displacement, and refugee camps and study short stories, nonfiction articles, and other media to supplement their study of this book.

It's possible that some families may take issue with some topics presented in this text (language, violence, graphic descriptions), but the reality is that these issues are a part of our world. We intend to address these issues from an academic standpoint and help students to understand the cultural roots of these problems and possible solutions.
