Small class sizes with peers and relaxed environments will aid in tending to social, emotional, and mental health needs. Counselors will be advised of students who need additional SEL support.

Evaluation:

The district will look at all available data to evaluate the effectiveness of interventions, including formative and summative data. Administrators will monitor implementation of SEL efforts via walk-throughs and conversations with students.
