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Abstract

The abstract and keywords are in Times New Roman size 11. The abstract should concisely describe and identify objective(s), methodology, findings, and implications of the study. It should be about 180 words (minimum) and 200 words (maximum), followed by three to five keywords related to your article.

Keywords: separate with a coma, present in alphabetical order, keyword, keyword, keyword.

INTRODUCTION

The article is in Times New Roman size 12. Indent the first line of every paragraph. State the objectives of your work and provide an adequate background, avoiding a detailed literature survey or a summary of the results. Explicitly state the gap in the literature, which signifies the significance of your research. Submissions should be between 5000-8000 (including abstract, table(s), figure(s) and references) in A4 size paper with margins as the following: top 3 cm, bottom 2.5 cm, right 2.5 cm and left 3.5 cm.

LITERATURE REVIEW

Include the current knowledge including substantive findings, as well as theoretical and methodological contributions to your topic. A literature review surveys books, scholarly articles, and any other sources relevant to a particular issue, area of research, or theory, and by so doing, provides a description, summary, and critical evaluation of these works in relation to the research problem being investigated.

METHODS

Provide sufficient detail to allow your work to be reproduced. Methods already published should be indicated by a reference: only relevant modifications should be described. It is preferred to have this section to be divided into subsections of Participants/Subjects, Instruments, Data Collection and Data Analysis.

RESULTS

Present the results of your work. Use graphs and tables if appropriate, but also summarize your main findings in the text. Do NOT discuss the results or speculate as to why something happened; that goes in the Discussion.

Guidelines for Using Graphs and Tables (Simplified)

1. **Presentation and Formatting**
Tables and figures must be numbered sequentially (e.g., Table 1, Figure 1) with clear, descriptive titles (above for tables, below for figures). Use Times New Roman 10–11 pt inside tables, avoid vertical lines, and ensure graphs are readable in grayscale (not color-dependent). Keep them concise and easy to understand.
2. **Placement and Referencing**
Insert each table/figure close to its first mention in the text, and always refer to it clearly (e.g., “As shown in Figure 2...”). Avoid repeating the same data in both table and figure form unless it adds value.
3. **Clarity, Consistency, and Attribution**
Ensure all axes, labels, legends, and units are clear and consistent across all visuals. If you adapt a table or figure from another source, provide proper citation and permission if needed.

DISCUSSION

Highlight the most significant results, but do not repeat what has been written in the Results section. The purpose of the discussion is to interpret and describe the significance of your findings in light of what was already known about the research problem being investigated, to connect the interpretation with relevant theories or references, and to compare them with findings from previous related studies. In addition, the discussion should outline the theoretical and practical implications of these findings.

CONCLUSION

Provide a clear answer to the stated research objectives by summarizing how the findings address the core questions of the study. Highlight the theoretical and practical implications that emerge from these findings. Address the limitations of the study. Moreover, recommendations for future research related to your topic should also be mentioned.

Acknowledge funding bodies and departments that supported the project, including financial



assistance; provide the grant number.

(follow the APA 7th style; ensure that all names/references cited in the text/article are included in the References section, and remove any that are not mentioned)

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APPENDICES (optional)

If there are multiple appendices, label them as Appendix A, Appendix B, etc. Number formulae and equations as Eq. (A.1), Eq. (A.2), etc.; in the next appendix, Eq. (B.1), and so on. Similarly, number tables and figures as Table A.1, Fig. A.1, etc.





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
