
2LT David G. Lem

David George Lem, son of Mr. and Mrs. John C. Lem, 114 Jefferson avenue, received his silver wings April 15 when he graduated as a second lieutenant from the Pecos, Tex., army air force advanced two-engine pilot school. Lieutenant Lem was assigned to Pecos from Minter Field, Calif. He is a graduate of Oshkosh High school and attended Oshkosh State Teachers college.

LT. DAYID LEM CILLED IN ACTION IN INDIA-BURMA AREA

A member of Oshkosh's only Chinese-American family, Lt. David George Lem, has given his life in service with United States forces aiding the defense of his family's native land.

American - born, Lieutenant Lem, son of Mr. and Mrs. John C. Lem, 114 Jefferson avenue, was killed in action March 6 in the India-Burma theater, according to information contained in a telegram from the war department.

He was born May 26, 1924, in Chicago, Ill. The family moved to Oshkosh when he was 2 years old. Lem attended Dale and Merrill schools and was graduated from High school in June of 1942. He also attended Oshkosh State Teachers college.

In Service Since '43

Lem was a member of band and patrol boys associations at High school. He was a member of the Boy Scouts for a number of years and of DeMolay and attended Badger Boys' State one summer, being elected fire chief.

He enlisted in the army air corps in October, 1942, and was inducted in February, 1943. He was stationed at several air fields in the states of Arizona and California and was graduated from the Pecos Army Air Field in Texas, April 15, 1944. Lem was sent to Columbia, S. C., for further training and left for overseas in the fall of that year.

Survivors besides his parents are five sisters, Mrs. C. C. Li of Chengtu, China; Sara Jane of Columbus, Ohio, and Nancy, Grace and Mary, all at home; three brothers, all of whom are in the service with the army air corps, Capt. Abel in France, Lt. Paul in India and Lt. John in Italy.
