Toll Gate High School English IV Honors Early Enrollment Program Summer Reading Assignment 2023

Students entering the English IV Honors Early Enrollment Program class will read two (2) literary works this summer. One work will be from a list, and the other work will be a free choice. There is a template of questions for each work for students to complete and use to compose an essay in class when school begins in September. The templates will be due on September 7, 2023. There is a third book, *How to Read Literature Like a Professor*, that is optional and purely for enrichment. Reading this book will aid students in their literary analysis of the works they read this summer and throughout the year.
