Math	Reading
<p>This month we will complete Module 5 of Eureka math and begin Module 6! In Module 5, scholars will focus on working with numbers 10-20 in order to help students successfully count by ones to 100. Module 6 gives students another opportunity to explore geometry. They further develop their spatial reasoning skills and begin laying the groundwork for an understanding of area through composition of geometric figures.</p>	<p>We will begin Unit 8 in Benchmark Reading. In this unit, students will read and compare selections about weather and learn how changing seasons affect our daily lives. Please continue to read to your scholar, and ask them questions about their reading. You can also support your scholar by practicing and reviewing the kindergarten heart words each day!</p>
Science	Social Studies
<p>In Science, we will begin learning how humans and other living things impact the environment they live in. Students will learn how trash impacts the environment and how students can make earth friendly choices.</p>	<p>In Social Studies, we will use experiences, such as classroom visitors, stories, and electronic media, to give examples of different choices people make about meeting their human needs for food, clothing, shelter, and other commonalities,</p>

<p>such as recreation, stories, and music. Scholars will give examples of qualities, such as customs, interests, skills, and experiences that make individuals and families in their immediate environment unique.</p>
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
