Remember that you cannot bring in anything from your experiment (such as samples, equipment, etc).
If you really want to show it, take a picture of it.

BE SURE YOU PUT YOUR NAME IN BLACK SHARPIE on the closed, top, right flap of your board.

Type and print out—scroll to page 2 on link for directions)</p> <p><u>Variables</u> —identify controlled, independent and dependent variables</p> <p><u>Procedure</u>—make sure the steps are in a numbered list</p> <p><u>Materials</u>—make sure they are listed</p>	<p><u>Title</u> (Cute, catchy, funny, short & sweet to hook the judge)</p> <p><u>Purpose</u> ("To determine the effect of _____ on _____.")</p> <p><u>Research Question</u> ("What is the effect of _____ on _____?")</p> <p><u>Hypothesis</u> ("If...then...will..." phrasing)</p> <p><u>Null Hypothesis</u> ("If...then...will not..." phrasing)</p> <p><u>Results: Data-- Graphs</u> (If you have too many pages of these to fit onto your board, staple them into a packet, then while presenting you can flip through them all)</p> <p><u>Pictures</u> --- 5 pics of you doing your experiment and of your materials, experimental set up and anything you feel is important to show.</p>	<p><u>Results: Data-- Charts</u> (If you have too many pages of these to fit onto your board, staple them into a packet, then while presenting you can flip through them all)</p> <p><u>Conclusions</u>--- 3 paragraphs (This should discuss which hypothesis was accepted and which was rejected, your research and how it helped you, a real-world application of your results, what you learned, how you'd do things differently if you were to re-do this project and what a future project that builds on this project could be.)</p> <p>**Staple your works cited to the end of your research paper. Attach a pocket by taping or gluing a page protector or manilla folder on the back of your backboard and keep the research paper in there.**</p>
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
