¹ For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery.

² Listen! I, Paul, am telling you that, if you let yourselves be circumcised, Christ will be of no benefit to you.

³ Once again I testify to every man who lets himself be circumcised that he is obliged to obey the entire law.

⁴ You who want to be reckoned as righteous by the law have cut yourselves off from Christ; you have fallen away from grace.

⁵ For through the Spirit, by faith, we eagerly wait for the hope of righteousness.

for these are opposed to each other, to prevent you from doing what you want.

¹⁸ But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not subject to the law.

¹⁹ Now the works of the flesh are obvious: sexual immorality, impurity, debauchery,

²⁰ idolatry, sorcery, enmities, strife, jealousy, anger, quarrels, dissensions, factions,

²¹ envy, drunkenness, carousing, and things like these.

I am warning you, as I warned you before: those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God.

the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, ²³ gentleness, and self-control.

There is no law against such things.

²⁴ And those who belong to Christ have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires.

²⁵ If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit.

²⁶ Let us not become conceited, competing against one another, envying one another.
