2. WHAT ABOUT PUBLIC SAFETY?

Cash bail reform is often cited as a cause for increased crime and a loss of public safety. Do the data bear this out? There is evidence that neither claim is accurate—pretrial release does not increase crime and it actually increases public safety. While there are highly publicized cases of a person who is bailed out committing a serious crime, these are rare. Their freedom was based on a judge's decision regarding their potential danger to the community, not on the bail being paid. The person would have been released If they could afford to pay their own bail and the result would have been the same.
