- Documentation of participation in activities, teams, organizations and clubs
- Documentation of volunteer activities, job shadowing and work experience (babysitting, lawn mowing, bring your child to work days, dog walking, raking leaves, etc.)
- Documentation of achievement (internet posts, certificates)
- Documentation of Parent Involvement

- Continue or start to teach your child about earning, saving, spending, and giving money.
- Continue or start saving for your child's postsecondary plans.
