ITEC Total Solution for Integrated Library Systems Scholarship programme experience: Chennai India

The Indian government's Indian Technical and Economic Cooperation Programme (ITEC) held a two-week fully funded training program from the 28th February to the 12th March 2024 on "Total Solution for Integrated Library Systems" in Chennai, India. This fully funded program welcomed 30 information professionals (librarians and records managers) from 17 developing countries of Bangladesh, Bhutan, Botswana, Ghana, Jamaica, Ethiopia, Fiji, Kenya, Malawi, Namibia, Niger, Seychelles, Tanzania, Uganda, Vietnam, Zambia and Zimbabwe.



The focus of the course under the coordination of Dr. Ravichandran was on the modernisation of libraries through learning to leverage library management Systems for optimised library processes, knowledge management including the creation, organisation, and effective communication of knowledge, Web resource maintenance and the promotion of e-learning. Hands on training was provided on key areas of KOHA library management system, DSpace open-source repository, Ubuntu operating system, delving on the installation, customisation and integration of the aforementioned tools. In addition, participants explored basic Linux coding as well as Copyright and intellectual property (IPR) issues and Open Educational Resources (OER) management.






The program went beyond traditional instruction, incorporating enriching sessions on yoga, sound healing, and team building. These workshops were led by renowned specialists in holistic education, fostering a deeper connection between mind, body, and spirit, and promoting collaboration among participants.





Beyond lectures, participants embarked on inspiring library tours. A visit to the Indian Institute of Technology- (IIT) library wasn't just about books; it was a chance to delve into the institute's rich history. Sprawling over 1,000 acres, the IIT campus itself was a marvel. Participants were captivated by the institute's dedication to preserving its indigenous flora. Towering trees offered a cool, leafy canopy, and glimpses of wild animals roaming freely added to the unique experience. The tranquil, picturesque setting provided a welcome respite from the academic environment. The tour also showcased the IIT library's commitment to fostering a love of learning at all ages, with a dedicated children's section specifically designed for staff children, a detail the participants found particularly admirable



The tour also included a visit to the historic Madras University Library at the University of Madras. The library holds a special significance as it was once led by Dr. S.R. Ranganathan, considered the "father of Library Science in India" for his ground-breaking contributions that continue to influence libraries worldwide. In Dr. Ranganathan's honor, the library continues to use some of his ingenious inventions, including the colon classification system and the chain indexing system. Participants were even able to see original library furniture pieces dating back to Dr. Ranganathan's tenure, offering a glimpse into the library's rich history and his lasting impact.















As part of the program, the international participants embarked on exciting cultural tours. The tours showcased the rich heritage of Tamil Nadu.



They also explored Arjuna's Penance, an intricate rock-cut monument depicting scenes from Hindu mythology.
