#### Just a little housekeeping:

Report cards are completed. Please let me know if there is anything odd. I am known to miss a square here and there as I complete them.

I hope you find (or found) a large stack of work that came home on Thursday. Please take a few minutes to go over the Human Growth and Development test with your student. They all learned SO MUCH but I can't encourage you enough to keep the lines of communication open. They are still curious.

You also will find two reading reports. One is a summary of all of the AR quizzes taken this year. Looking at the sheer volume of books read this year makes me giddy! This class loved to read and I hope they keep it up. There is also an iReady report that shows test scores from the three tests taken this year. I was blown away by the growth made by many students. A typical 5th grader grows by 18 points and should end the year at a score of 608 or higher. HOWEVER, these are just one day computerized tests that give one small perspective. If your child is not where we would expect, I have completed multiple other reading assessments and determined that we are all reading just fine! Face to face reading assessments always give better feedback and everyone did a great job. If you have any questions about reading, please don't hesitate to reach out.

Research (Who Was) projects were also handed back. If there are not comments on the packet, they were given digitally through Classroom.

The last days of school were quite remarkable. If you have a chance to thank the graduation committee, please do. Not only was graduation perfect, but the Rocky Mountain Day Camp with Sweet Cow ala mode was FANTASTIC. Thank you for financially and/or physically supporting such a fun way to end elementary school.

I have NEVER had such an emotional class as this one. The tears were flowing freely on Thursday afternoon. We talked a lot about how sadness comes only when there is great happiness. As my dear pal Winner the Pooh says, "How lucky I am to have something that makes saying goodbye so hard." Your children's tears were a testament to what a great elementary school experience they had with an amazing group of friends. I trust they will take those strong feelings forward to find happiness wherever they may go.

Finally, my heartfelt thanks for helping us all to make this a good year. I try to never underappreciate the support you all provide at home that makes our days at school successful so I hope you all felt my gratitude. But I will thank you yet again. Thank you so much for showering me with support and gifts.

The gifts cards, flowers, chai, notes, classroom supplies and hugs have all been so wonderful. Thank you for taking the time and know that every gift is sincerely appreciated. # **April 8, 2019**

Dear 5K Parents.

I will try to be brief but know that there will be quite a few announcements in the coming weeks as we have so much going on and I don't want to lose any of the thousand balls we are juggling!!

- 1: Homework Because of CMAS, cursive and reading for 30 minutes are the only homework. Please check the OOPS spreadsheet. We are doing the math 'homework' in class. When you see math come home, take a minute to look at the worksheet. Anything that is circled is incorrect and anything that has a box around it was not attempted. I ask you to look with your child as those boxes indicate one of two things - your student is not using class time to get their work done and/or they are not taking the opportunity to write down the correct answers as we go over EVERY problem together. It's worth a conversation at home.
- 2: Long term research project: students will be researching and writing their own "Who Was" book. We will be learning and practicing research skills in class but THE PROJECT WILL BE COMPLETED ENTIRELY AT HOME!! It is due May 3rd which is 3 1/2 weeks away. This is when students will be practicing their long term time management skills. They have set a goal for themselves this week to find a few good resources by Friday. I will try to update you each week on what goals they have set so you can support them at home.

(And speaking of Who Was books, if you see any floating around your house the have 5K or Newfield written on the spine, please return them. Thanks!)

- 3: Caberet is Thursday at 8:30. Have your students wear black and white ish. Please do not purchase anything, just as neutral as your clean clothes will allow.
- 4: CalWood is not that far away. Take a look at the packing list so you won't be caught off guard.
- 5: And lastly, as the weather becomes delightfully warmer, the shorts and t-shirts are coming out of the closet. Remember that your student may have grown quite a bit since last fall. Shorts can become shorter and tops can become skimpier. As we enter this last science unit on Human Growth and Development, we try to honor that students are all at different developmental and comfort levels and appreciate any support you can give to helping us keep the focus on the academics as we are often

#### **January 29, 2019**

# Conferences begin next week. They are student led so be sure your student will be available at the time you sign up!!!

Thank you all for carving out time to come see what your student is accomplishing this year. This will be their last PTC of elementary school! It's the first step toward that graduation in May.

We have been having fun with mixtures and solutions. Ask your student about lemonade and rainbow colored salt water. We will finish up this week and start body systems next week. Be mindful of absences for the next few weeks. We will be mixing all of the 5th graders up into 4 groups that will rotate through each teacher for a different body system. That makes it a little trickier to catch students up on content.

We just finished writing procedures and will be diving into some poetry for a bit. And we are reading The Watsons Go To Birmingham - 1963 together as a class. Ask your student about Byron and his do!

In math, we will finish up with multiplying and dividing fractions and moving into decimals in the next week. Most students have figured out the formulas for solving these problems but few have mastered how to draw a picture to explain their thinking. Take a look at Seesaw this week as you will have a few examples to see. Finally, a plea for snow shovels. If anyone has an extra lying around, we could use one. The kids would happily shovel off the blacktop if they just had a shovel. THANKS!

## **January 14, 2018**

Happy New Year! We are off to great start. I was so excited to see everyone again after the break and we are back into our stride quickly. I love it!

Some curricular updates: we have moved back to science for a few months after wrapping up the settling of the new world (and thankfully everyone survived!). We started mixtures and solutions today and will follow this unit with body systems. We have been working on writing personal narratives in a variety of different formats and should have our works published in the next week or two. Tomorrow we will begin a class book, The Watsons Go To Birmingham - 1963. We will be doing most of the reading of this book at school but you may see it at home from time to time as make up work. It does take place in 1963 so if you wanted to support with background conversations at home, that is always a plus. And we are multiplying fractions in math these days. They are all getting very frustrated with me as I won't let them do it the easy way - we are drawing the concepts so the understanding goes deep.

We will have quite a few field trips coming in March, April and May. I do have several parents who have volunteered for the big CalWood trip but want to be sure there wasn't anyone else who was anxious to spend three days with 100 10 year olds! Just let me know!

And conferences are just around the corner as signups will be released next week. ALL WINTER CONFERENCES ARE STUDENT LED. Your student will be leading their own conference for all of us so when you find a time slot, be sure your student can attend also. I realize that after school sports and activities can make that hard so if you are having trouble finding an available time, let me know. I can schedule them outside of the three conference days.

As always, I love spending time with your kids. Thank you for sharing them with me. They never cease to make me smile!

#### **December 10, 2018**

Happy Holiday season to all. These weeks between Thanksgiving and Winter Break can be so so busy and I really appreciate you all keeping in touch with me about comings and goings. I'll try to be brief:

Tomorrow, Dec. 11 - Field trip to CalWood - PLEASE DRESS YOUR STUDENT FOR WINTER!!! We will be outside all day. The forecast for CalWood says a high of 41 and that will likely

#### September 8, 2018

I always feel like September is the real start to school. Once we pass Labor Day, there is no doubt that we are fully back to school. We are truly settled in now. We had a class meeting this week and one of the kiddos summed up the start to our year so well: "This is a really nice class and I really like how everyone is kind and helpful." I couldn't have said it better myself.

We are still getting our math feet under us working on multiples, factors, math facts and math vocabulary. We will be starting our first unit in Geometry after next week. We are learning about the water cycle and weather vs. climate in science. We have been reading about poetry and reading poetry to find inspiration for our own writing. And we make time every day for silent reading. This class loves to read - and that makes me happy!!!

Fall Fun Days are this week so remember to pack hats, sunscreen and water bottles on Wednesday and Thursday. And also note that students do not have school on Monday, September 17th. (Teachers will be in professional development classes all day.)



I hope to see many of you on Wednesday evening at Back To School Night. We will have time to look at the schedule for the year, talk about expectations, and answer any questions you may have. If you cannot make it, let me know and I'll be sure to forward any important information you way.

The first piece of homework came home on Friday. Every week students will receive a cursive packet on Friday and it is due the following Friday. As we begin our first weeks of cursive, it can be very hard for some students. PLEASE DO NOT LET YOUR STUDENT SPEND MORE THAN 30-40 MINUTES A WEEK ON THE PACKET!!!! It is intended to help them learn cursive, not for them to become frustrated! If you student is struggling to complete the cursive, please talk to me!!!


The second piece of homework will come home on Monday. Every Monday, students will receive a sheet of math practice. We will go over it in class on Monday so the homework for Monday night through Wednesday night will be to practice what we have learned. It should not take more than about 10-15 minutes to complete each night. Again, if your student is taking more than that, please let me know so that we can make adjustments.

We are settling nicely into our routines and I am learning about what a remarkable group of students are in 5K this year!

## 5K, August 19th, 2018

We had a great first few days in 5K. I will be able to share a lot more at Back to School Night (which will be on August 27th!!!) but for now I have a few important messages.

- 1 Instrumental Music begins tomorrow. Students will be coming home with a packet of information for you. Please look over it as there are important dates and times for instrument rentals.
- 2. We have our first field trip to North Boulder Park on Friday, August 31st. Any and all parents are welcome to join us. We will be picnicking and team building to start the year off right.
  - 3. Please ask your student about their homework folder. It will be traveling along side their planner EVERY DAY to and from school. Please help the establish good routines now for remembering those items each day.
- 4. Encourage your student to read for 30 minutes every single day. It is the single most effective thing a child can do to succeed in school! Take a look at the graph in the next slide.



#### Why Can't I Skip My 20 Minutes of Reading Tonight?

Student "A" reads 20 minutes each day

3600 minutes in a school year

Student "B" reads 5 minutes each day 900 minutes in

a school year

Student "C" reads 1 minute each day

180 minutes in a school year

50th percentile

8,000 words

10th percentile

By the end of 6th grade Student "A" will have read the equivalent of 60 whole school days. Student "B" will have read only 12 school days. Which student would you expect to have a better vocabulary?
