Winona — (April 11, 2019) Saint Mary's Press and the California Catholic Conference Education Committee, led by Auxiliary Bishop Edward Clark of Los Angeles, have launched a new eLearning course, *California Native Peoples and Missions*, for fourth grade Catholic school classrooms statewide.

Created in partnership with Catholic educators, tribal leaders, and mission directors, this three-week, online course celebrates Native Americans and Missions. Based on the 2016 *History–Social Science* framework, “California: A Changing State,” this course ensures that both California Indians and Saint Junipero Serra and his missionary ministry are represented in a culturally-sensitive and historically-accurate way.

“This curriculum, which shows a great deal of respect to our people, opens the eyes of students to the fact that Native Americans still exist and are their neighbors, today,” says Acjachemen tribe member, Jacque Tahuka Nunez, master storyteller and teacher. “We are all responsible to make choices that build a cohesive, positive, respectful community. This course has planted a seed in the hearts of students and lets them know their choices matter.”

California Native Peoples and Missions adheres to the “Try-Teach” pedagogy that promotes student-centered and inquiry-based active learning. Content is chunked into digestible parts to promote discovery, critical thinking, and reading with purpose.

“This is a beautiful and interactive curriculum. Each lesson brings the California Native Peoples’ history and significant contributions to life,” says fourth grade teacher Maureen Griffin. “It celebrates the foundation of our Catholic faith in the United States through the founding of California’s missions.”

California Native Peoples and Missions includes three units, consisting of 15 interactive, multimedia lessons, that incorporate engaging and inspiring photographs, stories, quotes and videos.
