Polling was conducted online from September 2 - 8, 2025. Using Dynamic Online Sampling to attain a representative sample, Change Research polled 855 likely voters statewide in North Carolina. Post-stratification was performed on age, gender, race/ethnicity, education, region, and 2024 presidential vote.
